Am submitting this proposal in response to request for ideas for possible neighborhood improvement projects that could be considered during the next budget season. The city's park currently has a trail in its southeast corner that ends just shy of Seven Locks Road. The proposal is to extend the trail to Seven Locks Road. (To be clear, the proposal does not involve the park's northeast corner and, e.g., Locks Pond Court or Oakenshire Drive which already have trail connections.)

What need or problem does this proposal address or solve?*

The proposal would significantly improve visitor access to Potomac Woods Park. At present, visitors currently either must drive into the park via Stratton Drive entrance (north) or walk in via Dunster Lane entrance (west) or Oakenshire Drive (northeast). There is no access via the southeast corner, which results in visitors having to walk all the way up Seven Locks Road and then Twin Oaks Drive and then Oakenshire. Or to walk Montrose Road and thread their way to Stratton Drive.

Approximately how many people would your proposal serve?*

It can't be a space issue because the space for the second lane is basically already paved under the pedestrian bridge there, only a sliver of green area needs to be turned into road and it would make a huge difference in alleviating traffic.

Describe Your Proposal*

I propose the installation of a single disc golf practice hole in our community park. The setup would include two permanent disc golf baskets positioned at opposite ends of a lightly wooded, unused green space. This design would allow residents to practice throws in both directions, simulating the experience of a full disc golf hole while maximizing the use of limited space. The area I would propose is currently unused, is well-suited with natural tree obstacles, and is safely distanced from both the playground and the walking path. The cost of installing two disc golf baskets, a tee pad and signage is modest (likely under \$3,000) compared to most park infrastructure projects, with minimal maintenance required once installed. The baskets are durable, weather-resistant, and can remain in place for many years with little upkeep. For a relatively low one-time investment, the community gains a long-lasting recreational amenity that broadens park use, promotes healthy activity, and delivers outsized value to a wide range of residents.

What need or problem does this proposal address or solve?*

This proposal addresses the lack of recreational variety and accessible outdoor fitness options for teens and adults in our community. While the park already provides excellent amenities for young children (playground), basketball players and walkers (path), there are limited other facilities that appeal to older youth, young adults, and families looking for alternative forms of recreation. Disc golf is a fast-growing, low-cost, and family-friendly sport that promotes outdoor activity, physical exercise, and community engagement. A practice hole allows residents to try the sport casually without requiring access to a full course. It also provides a safe, inclusive, and healthy outlet that complements existing park amenities without interfering with them.

Approximately how many people would your proposal serve?*

The practice hole could reasonably serve hundreds of unique residents each year, with the potential for frequent repeat use by regular players. It would add meaningful value to the park for a wide variety of residents who may not currently have a recreational option there.

I propose to relandscape and beautify the two beds with the "West End" sign in the median strip of Beall Ave. near N. Washington Street. At this time, the holly bushes are scraggly, dead or half -dead. The soil is bare and bone dry. The low-growing junipers in the beds are healthy and green but the beds have not had any flowers or pollinator plants in them for years. I feel sad every time I walk by them. I propose the following: Remove the dead holly bushes and prune the half-dead ones to rejuvenate and shape them. Add ten bags of Leaf Gro and topsoil to supplement and build the soil. Plant flowering, mostly native, perennials and annuals. We have evergreen Carex, mountain mint, monarda, anise hyssop, and other plants that I'd like to divide and contribute. I start seedlings of annuals each spring, such as deer resistant marigolds, basil, and alyssum. Mulch the area to conserve moisture and prevent weeds. The Rockville Maintenance Facility has free mulch. The median beds would need about 30 cubic feet/one cubic yard of mulch.

The proposal improves a sad, neglected eyesore and beautifies our community. The West End sign is the introduction to a large neighborhood. It could be beautiful and exciting. Pollinator flowering plants are good for the environment. They lift the spirits of people walking or driving by the beds each day. 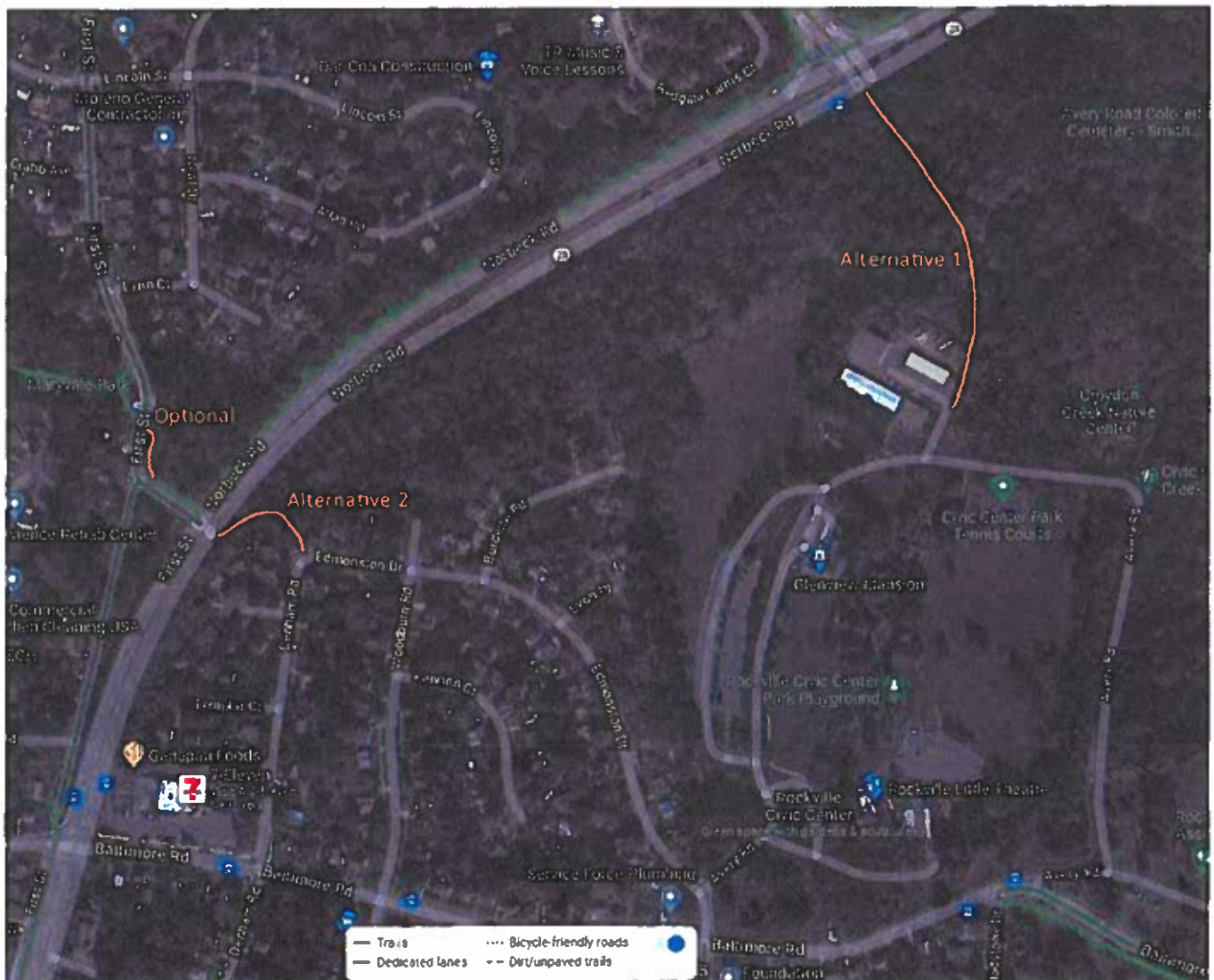

Proposal 1: Civic Center Foot/Bike Route(s)

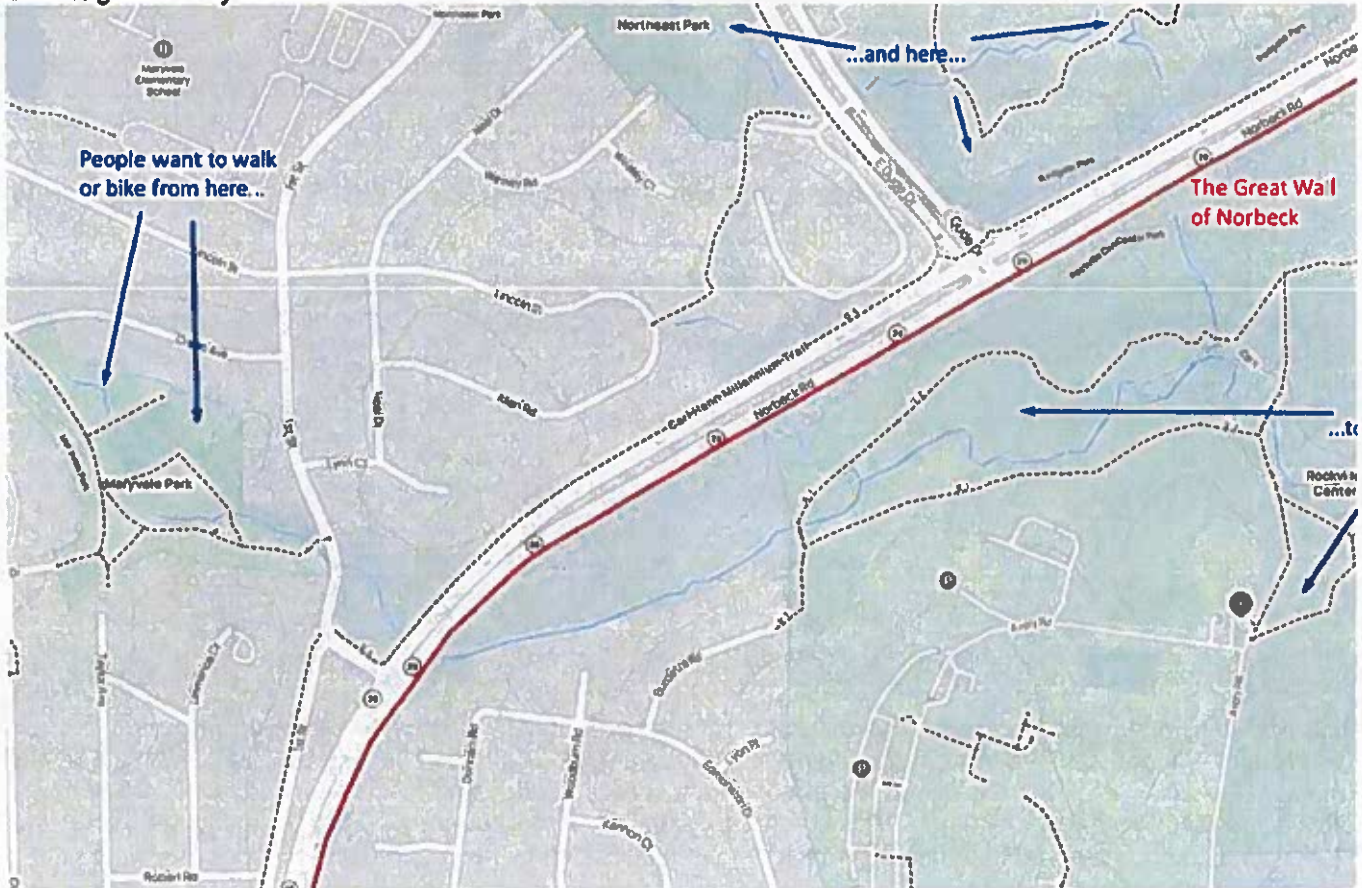
What:

- Add a crosswalk over Norbeck Road at the intersection with Gude Drive, followed by a foot/bike path through the woods to Avery Road, or directly to the Civic Center Croydon Creek Trail
- Alternatively or additionally; add a crosswalk and trail from the First Street intersection to the corner of Edmonston Drive.
- Optionally; extend the Millenium Trail a short way along the east side of First Street and add a crossing, to properly connect it to Maryvale Park.



Why:

The Civic Center area is full of great city resources like the Croydon Creek Nature Center, Tennis Courts, Glenview Mansion, and F.Scott Theater. As the crow flies, East Rockville is really close to the civic center, but there is currently no good pedestrian or bicycle route between them. The current route involves going south to Baltimore Road, which is busy and has incomplete sidewalk coverage. The Millenium Bike Trail is already a great resource, but it would be so much better if it offered a connection between our neighborhood and all of those resources, so we could take better advantage of the facilities our tax dollars are funding. In addition, these routes would provide better options for children to be able to walk/bike to Rockville High School from East Rockville - especially if the Civic Center Croydon Creek trail could be connected to the High School grounds by the Football Stadium.



Proposal 2: Northeast Park Foot/Bike Path

What:

Add an asphalt footpath/bike path to connect First Street, Neal Drive, and Wesley Road to Gude Drive and the existing asphalt path that partially crosses Northeast Park.



Why:

There is an existing, partially overgrown, dirt path that runs between First St., Neal Dr., and Wesley Rd. Residents regularly use this dirt path to get to the bus stops at Taft and First Streets and to get to the retail shops at Gude Dr. and Taft. However, the existing path can get muddy and overgrown and is not usable by bicycles (except maybe dirt bikes). A modest asphalt path, like those currently in Red Gate and Maryvale Parks, would improve pedestrian and bicycle access to the residential neighborhood.

Proposal 3: Maryvale Park Shared-Use Path

What:

Addition of a pathway from Charles/Park to Maryvale Park entrance at Taylor Avenue via the city-owned parcels under which lies the current water line.



Why:

Better connecting residents along Taylor Avenue with Rockville Metro and points west (shaving an estimated 2-4 minutes off walking time) by allowing people to walk via Park and Horners to Rockville Metro Station. Currently, people would need to enter the park and go up the steep hill to McArthur Dr, which is a longer walk and one that is more difficult for older people, those with disabilities, and those on bikes/micro-mobility devices.

Dear Hon. Mayor Ashton and City of Rockville Councilmembers,

The Rockville Pedestrian Advocacy Committee (RPAC) thanks you for your continued support to advance pedestrian safety throughout the City. Increasing safe, direct, and connected pedestrian accessibility is one of the most effective approaches to improving environmental sustainability, equitable communities, and economic resiliency. RPAC supports the City's recent efforts to construct new sidewalks on Crawford Drive, Gail Avenue, Virginia Avenue, and Welsh Park Drive; traffic calming measures at Twinbrook Parkway and Meadow Hall Drive, Wootton Parkway and Longhill Drive, and Mannakee Street and Smallwood Road; and new crosswalks and curb ramps throughout the City, among other improvements.

As the Fiscal Year 2027 budget process continues, RPAC looks forward to the City's ongoing investment in pedestrian accessibility and safety. Furthermore, we recommend the City consider the following projects for the FY 2027 budget.

1. Additional street and sidewalk lighting in City Parks.

Many residents and visitors use shared use paths and sidewalks in City parks for transportation as well as recreation. Providing lighting along these routes will help ensure safer pedestrian transportation throughout the day, which is necessary for people walking and rolling to and from work in the winter when there is less daylight. Specifically, we request the City add lighting on paths in and along Welsh Park and Rockcrest Park.

2. Shared use path connection between the Lakewood Elementary School pedestrian bridge and Carl Henn Millennium Trail.

There is a valuable grade separated pedestrian bridge connecting Lakewood Elementary School and the Glenora Park neighborhood. This bridge also travels over the Carl Henn Millennium Trail, however, there is no direct access from the trail to

the bridge, which are approximately 100 feet apart. Providing this short connection would make it much easier for trail users to cross Wootton Parkway. Also, this connection is included in the 2023 Pedestrian Master Plan.

3. Bus Stop Improvements

Many pedestrians in Rockville are dependent upon public transportation for longer distance travel in the City and region. Providing better facilities at bus stops would make public transit use not only more comfortable, but also more accessible, safe, and dignified. Many transit riders are not able to stand for long periods of time to wait for buses or must wait in adverse weather conditions. Providing seating and shelters at all bus stops in the city would improve the level of service for public transit in Rockville. The City recently completed a project to add to bus shelters and other amenities to some Rockville stops. We encourage the city to continue these efforts. Additionally, the Vision Zero Action Plan includes an Action Item to evaluate transit stop safety. While the City has made efforts to shift the location of bus stops to be closer to marked crosswalks, the City should also consider improving stops themselves.

4. Sidewalks along Viers Mill Road

The sidewalk network between First Street (MD 28) and the Rock Creek Trail/Twinbrook Connector Trail connection is irregular. There are sections with no sidewalk, sections with sidewalks that abruptly end and require pedestrians to cross the service roads mid-block and to use driveways instead of curb ramps. We recommend the city provide funds in the budget to evaluate and improve the sidewalks along Viers Mill Road for improved pedestrian access and safety.

5. Improved Access to Bus Stops

While most bus stops are accessible from existing sidewalks, there are some bus stops where the existing sidewalks are in poor condition, or the stop is otherwise not accessible. We recommend the city to dedicate additional resources to inventory the bus stops that are not accessible and prioritize the construction and maintenance of sidewalk facilities to make these stops accessible.

Safety benefits of benches:

- Reduces street risk: Keeps people, particularly children and the elderly, away from traffic by giving them a designated spot to wait, reducing risks from hit-and-runs or accidents while walking to/from the stop.
- Improves visibility: Makes riders more visible to approaching buses and cars, especially when placed correctly within a clear line of sight.
- Encourages use: Makes stops more accessible and comfortable, encouraging people to wait at the designated, safer area rather than by an unoccupied building or in less visible spots


6. Pedestrian Safety Education Materials for Students and Motorists

The City has made excellent progress to expand sidewalks and other multimodal facilities in the City. Additional education would supplement these efforts and help reiterate best practices regarding the new multimodal facilities. Additionally, educational efforts targeted to motorists would be valuable for all roadway users. We recommend the city engage in an outreach campaign specifically for students and for motorists, reminding everyone the responsibility to travel safely.

We thank you for the time and dedication you have already shown to support improving the pedestrian environment and increasing walking and rolling in the City. We ask that you consider the above projects to further pedestrian accessibility and mobility.

We would be happy to discuss these pedestrian priority projects and others and we look forward to our ongoing cooperation with you and City staff to making Rockville better everyday.

Dear Mayor Ashton and Councilmembers,

MBIA on behalf of the building and development community, we write to express concern regarding the significant fee increases currently being proposed by the City of Rockville. While we understand the need for municipalities to periodically review and update fee schedules to ensure cost recovery and maintain high-quality services, the magnitude of the proposed increases raises serious concerns about the potential impact on housing production, redevelopment activity, and overall economic growth in the city.

One example of particular concern is the proposed increase to the building permit fee, which would rise from \$0.28 per square foot to \$0.60 per square foot—more than doubling the current rate. Such a substantial increase, particularly when combined with other development-related fees that being increased, could meaningfully raise the cost of construction and further strain the financial feasibility of new residential and commercial projects.

At a time when the region continues to face significant housing supply challenges, policies that increase development costs risk slowing the pace of new housing delivery and redevelopment efforts. Higher fees ultimately translate into higher project costs, which can discourage investment or be passed along in the form of higher housing prices and rents.

We respectfully encourage the City to carefully evaluate the cumulative impact of these proposed increases. Consideration should be given to a phased implementation schedule, additional stakeholder engagement, and transparency regarding the cost basis used to justify the increases. A collaborative approach will help ensure that the City can meet its operational needs while maintaining a development environment that supports housing production and economic vitality.

We appreciate the opportunity to provide input on this matter and look forward to continued dialogue with the City as this proposal moves forward.

Dear Mayor, Members of the City Council, and City Manager,

On behalf of the Greater Rockville Chamber of Commerce and the 400+ businesses we represent, I am writing to express strong concern regarding the proposed increases to permit and license fees, particularly those associated with sign permits.

Rockville’s businesses are already operating in a challenging economic environment. Employers and small business owners are managing rising labor costs, escalating commercial rents, higher insurance premiums, inflation in goods and services, and ongoing regulatory requirements. Additional increases in municipal fees—especially those that directly impact basic business operations—create further financial pressure at a time when many businesses are working simply to maintain stability and remain competitive.

Rockville’s economic strength is closely tied to the success of its small and locally owned businesses, which make up most of the the city’s commercial community and contribute significantly to local employment, commercial occupancy, and tax revenue. Policies that increase the cost of basic business operations—such as permits and licenses—can have disproportionate impacts on small businesses that operate with tighter margins than larger companies. When regulatory costs rise without corresponding improvements in efficiency or service delivery, businesses may delay investments, reduce improvements such as signage or storefront upgrades, or reconsider expansion within the city. Maintaining a competitive and predictable cost environment is therefore essential not only for supporting existing businesses, but also for attracting new investment and sustaining Rockville’s long-term economic vitality.

Signage plays a critical role in the economic success of small businesses. For many retailers, restaurants, and service providers, signage is their primary means of attracting customers and establishing visibility within commercial corridors. When sign permit fees become excessively high, businesses may delay or forgo installing or updating signage, limiting their ability to effectively reach customers and compete in the marketplace. This can have a ripple effect on commercial vitality, as visible and well-maintained storefronts contribute to active, attractive business districts that benefit the entire community. Ensuring that sign permit fees remain reasonable and aligned with those of neighboring jurisdictions is important to maintaining Rockville’s reputation as a welcoming and competitive place to start and grow a business.

From a policy perspective, the Chamber is concerned that continued increases in business-related permit and license fees may weaken Rockville’s competitive position relative to neighboring jurisdictions in Montgomery County and the broader region. Businesses routinely compare regulatory costs, permit processes, and administrative burdens when deciding where to locate, expand, or reinvest. If the total cost of doing business in Rockville becomes disproportionately higher than nearby communities, it may influence location decisions and long-term investment.

The Greater Rockville Chamber of Commerce respectfully recommends that the City:

- Conduct a benchmarking analysis comparing Rockville’s permit and license fees with those of surrounding jurisdictions to ensure the City remains competitive.
- Evaluate the cumulative regulatory cost burden on businesses rather than reviewing individual fees in isolation.
- Engage the business community, including the Chamber, prior to implementing fee increases to ensure policies reflect real operational impacts.
- Pair any future fee adjustments with measurable improvements in permitting efficiency, transparency, and turnaround times.
- Consider phased implementation or small-business considerations to mitigate disproportionate impacts.

Rockville has long benefited from a vibrant and diverse business community. Policies that support entrepreneurship, investment, and business retention ultimately strengthen the City’s tax base, employment opportunities, and long-term economic health.

The Greater Rockville Chamber of Commerce values its partnership with the City and stands ready to work collaboratively on policies that support both fiscal responsibility and a thriving local economy. We respectfully urge the City of Rockville to carefully consider the broader economic impact of these proposed increases and to engage the business community before moving forward with changes that could affect Rockville's competitiveness.

Dear Madame Mayor and Rockville City Council,

My name is Jake Jakubek and I live at 319 Grandin Ave in Croydon Park. I am the chair of the Rockville Bicycle Advisory Committee and am speaking in my official capacity.

Thank you for providing the community with the opportunity to comment on the city's budget every year. As Councilmember Myles stated in the last committee meeting, "it feels like we're always in budget season, coming into the season, or leaving budget season!"

Alas, that is city governance and it is our opportunity to provide direction for our city.

I am here to offer some comments on considerations for the council with respect to the document that has been put forth. RBAC has provided comments on our city's budget over the past 4 years and we feel it is important to weigh in on the committee's priorities.

Today, I wanted to remind the council of some safe streets projects we have coming up that are longer term and will require some planning to be able to execute them when we complete the preliminary work. The city is working on two projects which will certainly be expensive and require significant effort: the Scott Drive and Veirs Drive Shared Use Path and the Fleet and Monroe Streets Complete Streets Project. Both of these projects are important in the city's goals of achieving Vision Zero where we prevent serious or fatal crashes on our roads.

Scott Drive and Veirs Drive will enable safe bicycle access from the western edge of Rockville to the Millenium Trail. This path passes by a elderly living facility, a school, and many homes. It will provide an excellent connection for people walking or cycling.

Being that this will be a shared use path and will likely involve property acquisition, it will be very expensive.

The Fleet and Monroe Streets Complete Streets Project will provide a shared use path for people near Town Center and Richard Montgomery School, access to the Town Center cycletracks, and will be a great connection for people in Rockville to walk or cycle to Town Center from the neighborhoods near the school.

being that this will be a shared use path and a complex project, it will also be very expensive.

I am writing to propose that the city consider these Vision Zero projects down the road in the current budget and plan for these in the future. I ask that the council plan to put money aside to prepare for larger safe streets projects such as these. With both of these projects being in preliminary stages, now is the time to begin planning on how we can pay for them when they are ready to be constructed.

Please begin planning how to pay for these important Vision Zero projects in the current budget.

Rockville Principals' Roundtable: Summary of Findings

Event Date: March 18, 2026

Participants: Education Commission, Mayor and Council, & School Principals

Topic 1: Mental Health, Safety, and Well-being

I. What We Heard

- **Rising Clinical Needs:** Increase in students with general anxiety, substance abuse (marijuana) and serious mental health concerns.
- **Environmental Stressors:** ICE and "world concerns" present in schools; ongoing food insecurity and pressure to "fit in" (grades, clothes, phones).
- **Targeted Demographics:** Notable needs among Latino/Latine youth and males.
- **Cycles of Stress:** Cyclical "spiraling" during Peak Times (Feb through Spring Break; End of Year; Thanksgiving to Christmas).

II. What Is Working

- **School Culture:** Building a "Culture of Acceptance"; over-communication that is transparent and intentional.
- **Peer & Mentor Programs:** Peer-to-Peer mentoring and Rockville Youth mentoring programs; "Each One Trusts One" (Frost); RMHS mentoring Middle Schoolers.
- **Clinical Partnerships:** Sheppard Pratt (Street Outreach) and Thrive (Meadow Hall) for therapist access.
- **Restorative Community Circles** (Lakewood) and "Wellness Wednesday." (during-school day time for unwinding)
- **Safety Personnel:** Security SSOs connection to elementary schools and increasing numbers and availability of Community Engagement Officers (CEOs).
- **Parenting Tools** (Twinbrook): Providing picture books that model positive behaviors for parents of students with behavioral challenges; identified as a scalable success for other elementary schools.

III. What Is Missing

- **Specialized Staff:** Bilingual Therapists and continuity with CEOs in every school.
- **Overloaded Social Workers;** building trust with families "takes time."
- **Infrastructure:** Cell phone tower requests; Wifi gaps and phone access in emergencies.
- **Resource Navigation:** Lack of trust in services; need for better referrals and summer continuity.
- **Early Intervention:** Expansion of youth mentoring and development programs to the elementary school level to establish support systems before students reach middle school.

I. What We Heard

- ICE & Security Concerns: ICE is a major concern and "top of mind" for families; high need for fear management and student well-being support.
- The Trust Gap: Significant trust issues; principals noted that siblings are frequently the primary caregivers for younger students.
- Newcomer Integration: Targeted support for Afghan families transitioning to the community; focus on lifestyle adjustment resources and student guidance regarding the care of shared facilities.
- Documentation Fears: Shared housing forms are not being completed due to legal/documentation fears, which blocks families from accessing City perks and resources.
- Access Barriers: Difficulty accessing food and aftercare; transportation/pick-up issues are exacerbated when documentation fears exist.
- Vulnerability: A noticeable decline in participation in community events.
- Street Data: Need to prioritize "Street Data" (qualitative/community-level feedback) when assessing weekly needs.

II. What Is Working

- Relationship Building: High consensus on the value of "Trusted Adults" and relationship-building to connect with families.
- Social Worker Bridge: School Social Workers are the key link for MS/HS students to access more after-school events.
- Engagement: Community breakfasts and targeted outreach efforts to engage schools.
- Food Security: Strong partnership with Manna Food Center

III. What Is Missing

- Language Access: Community resources specifically for families in Pashto (high need); noted lack of support from MCPS for this specific language.
- Health Services: Dedicated support for Vision and Hearing. (Note: Food insecurity is being addressed, but these health gaps remain).
- Systemic Gaps: Perceived lack of support from MCPS central regarding community resource navigation.

- **Housing Stability:** [MPDU Rental Program](#), [Housing & Community Development](#), and [Landlord-Tenant Complaint Forms](#)
- **Financial Assistance:** The [Rockville Emergency Assistance Program \(REAP\)](#) and [Recreation Financial Assistance](#)

What Can the City Do? & Next Steps

I. Strategic Recommendations for City Action

- **Scaling Proven Wins:** Shift from "pockets of success" to City-wide equity. This includes expanding **Peer-to-Peer Mentoring** and the **Latino Youth Development Program** into more schools.
- **Emergency Infrastructure:** Explicit request for Cell Phone Tower and addressing Wifi gaps on campuses to ensure phone access and safety during emergencies. The County says this is a City issue.
- **Specialized Staffing:** A clear call for Bilingual Therapists and Pashto-language resources (noting a current lack of support from MCPS in this area).
- **Direct Access to Health:** Requests for Mobile Clinics / Mobile Med to bring Vision, Hearing, and Dental support directly to schools. Telehealth & Virtual Visits: Per Councilmember Dr. Myles, exploring the integration of virtual medical visits to reduce family travel barriers, minimize student absences, and streamline the diagnostic process for families.
- **Breaking the Trust Barrier:** Address the "Documentation Fear" that prevents families from using existing City housing and recreation subsidies. This requires a shift to "**Presence-to-Partnership**" moving City staff out of City Hall and into school-based events (PTA meetings, Back-to-School nights) to facilitate on-the-spot, trusted enrollment.
- **Closing the Language & Health Gap:** Direct intervention is needed for the underserved Pashto-speaking community and for students lacking access to basic Vision, Hearing, and Dental care through the exploration of mobile clinic partnerships.
- **Operational Support for Schools:** "Offload" the administrative burden of social service navigation from school staff. Consider a City Human Services Liaison who can help schools navigate complex housing, utility, or CPS crises in real-time. They need a navigator who can bypass bureaucracy without triggering family documentation fears.
- **Strategic Timing:** Target opportunities and programs to match "Peak Stress Times" (Feb through Spring Break; End of Year; Thanksgiving to Christmas).

II. Next Steps: FY 2027 Budget Advocacy

The Education Commission will present these findings during the **Monday, March 23, 2026, Budget Hearing.**

- **Scaling Successful Mentoring:**
 - Peer-to-Peer mentoring (RMHS students helping Middle Schoolers) and Rockville Youth mentoring programs were cited as successes. DARE/SADD were identified as successes.
 - We recommend an expansion of the Youth Mentoring, DARE/SADD and the Latino Youth program budgets to ensure these programs are accessible in every school cluster in Rockville.
- **Expanding the "Trusted Adult" Model:**
 - Principals cited "Restorative Community Circles" and "Trusted Adults" as some of the top success stories.
 - We recommend that the new FTE Police Officers and the new CEO be specifically trained in Restorative Justice and Relationship-Building models to scale the successes seen at Lakewood and Frost.
- **Enhancing Outreach:**

- Findings show families are "doubling up" and skipping services due to "Documentation Fears."
- We recommend that City outreach (REAP, Housing, Rec Vouchers) implement a "Presence-to-Partnership" model- funding "Pop-Up" resource desks at school events to facilitate trusted, on-site enrollment, presence at high school sports events and community events.
- We recommend dedicated resources for Afghan family integration, specifically focused on community navigators and "orientation" resources for utilizing City facilities.

Appendix I: Principals Roundtable Feedback 3/20/26

Participants reported high value in the networking opportunities and the practical City resources distributed throughout the event.

I. Main Themes

Strategic Collaboration: The consensus centered on the importance of peer-to-peer connection and shared leadership strategies.

- Collaborative Breakouts: High consensus on the value of sharing cross-school experiences and peer-led problem-solving.
- Connection & Alignment: Networking with City leadership and Commission members provided clarity on broader municipal goals.
- Event Logistics: High value placed on the professional yet inclusive atmosphere, including the quality of hospitality.

II. Helpful Resources

Resource Awareness: Several specific City initiatives were identified as high-impact for school communities.

- Financial & Clinical Support: High interest in REAP, mental health partnerships, and housing programs tailored for educators.
- Community Navigation: Recognition of "Main Street" services for adult learners and essential public safety protocols.
- Informational Infrastructure: Abundance of materials provided in the resource folders cited as a key takeaway.

III. Suggestions and Follow-up

Future Considerations: The following areas were identified for continued partnership and growth.

- Digital Integration: Requests for electronic toolkits to facilitate easier dissemination of City resources to families.
- Targeted Information: Need for deeper dives into specific crises, such as ongoing food insecurity.

- **Strategic Inclusivity:** Appreciation for the representation of diverse school models, including private institutions.
- **Operational Continuity:** Desire to maintain the current roundtable format and high standard of logistics.

Appendix II: Summary of Principals Roundtable Pre-Meeting RSVP Survey Submissions

City Resource Interests

- **Community & Social Services:** There is widespread interest in emergency rental assistance, food and utility support, and Latino youth development programs.
- **Mental Health Support:** School-based counseling and expanded therapeutic services are the most frequently requested resources to support student well-being.
- **Recreation & Youth Programming:** Continued partnership in providing affordable summer camps, youth sports, and subsidized after-school programs is highly valued.
- **Housing & Public Safety:** Leadership is interested in hearing more about affordable housing initiatives, landlord-tenant support, and collaborative public safety efforts.

- **Academic Excellence & Growth:** Schools report significant improvements in math and literacy scores, high state rankings, and increased student participation in advanced high school-level coursework.
- **Strengthened Community Ties:** There is a strong trend of increased family engagement, active PTA involvement, and the development of meaningful community partnerships that foster a sense of belonging.
- **Improved Student Support:** Successes include the implementation of new mental health partnerships, the introduction of safety programs like DARE, and improved attendance.

We are prepared to show you how every dollar of this grant is maximized to protect Rockville's heritage, AND we are confident you will see that our services are not just beneficial, but irreplaceable.

WE not only amplify 50 years of research, collections, and community relationships to deliver place-based heritage services that celebrate Rockville's journey to today's diverse modern City. - BUT we do it with a lean staff and conservative fiscal management that keeps overhead low and multiplies the City's dollars.

Peerless Rockville is navigating a challenging national landscape where federal support for accurate, inclusive history has disappeared, increasing competition for private funding. Without operational funds that can pay staff, cover rent, printing, and special program development we fear we must trim or eliminate essential services.

Funding at 2026 levels (\$100K in FY 27 dollars) is a vital investment in Rockville's cultural infrastructure. We seek a champion who understands that 'inclusive history' is more than a phrase—it is our shared reality.

Rockville Budget 2026-27 Testimony for Mayor and Council

From Dick Stoner, Peerless Rockville Board Member

March 23, 2026

Hello Madam Mayor and Councilmembers;

I'm Dick Stoner, a 40+ year resident of Rockville. I've served in a volunteer capacity for Economic Development (now REDI) and Peerless Rockville Historic Preservation, as well as other fun things like the Memorial Day parade, in which we once entered an award winning " kids sports float". I have served on the Peerless Board, as a member and the President.

I'm here to bring attention to historic preservation in our City. While not a basic human service, preservation serves an important role for all residents in terms of displaying positive values and the interesting physical characteristics of the stories that have shaped our local landscape. Here is a personal example of a Peerless success story that helps preserve Rockville, as a notable place for medical and scientific endeavors, while costing the City nothing.

In 2008, I was fortunate (in retrospect) to have been laid off from a professional position, and I was able to volunteer time with Peerless Rockville Historic Preservation, which was in the throws of trying to save parts of the Chestnut Lodge property. As you know, the Lodge, an 1880's Hotel, was lost to fire, but that was after Peerless worked with the developer to be sure two of the homes built during the early 20th century were preserved. The prominent white cape cod home which can now be seen by all from West Montgomery avenue, was empty, unused but intact with it's 1937 components in 2008. Peerless was able to convince the developer to donate Frieda's Cottage, and the first \$ 100,000 to it's restoration rather than have it torn down. Another \$ 100,000 and more was negotiated by Peerless through the Maryland historical trust's preservation loan fund. Under Peerless' leadership a wide group of community volunteers helped with cleaning, exterior clearing and painting as part of the restoration. Frieda's Cottage is now a National Historic Landmark, as you know, for it's connection to Dr. Frieda Fromm-Reichmann, a woman who came to Chestnut Lodge to escape Nazi Germany and became a world-recognized leader and innovator in the treatment of people with mental disorders.

This home is now rented at an affordable price, and can be enjoyed on the outside by all who visit the Chestnut Lodge grounds park. Grants secured by Peerless and rental income

provide all the resources required to preserve the property. Without Peerless the property would fall into disrepair and abandonment and become a burden to the city.

I am here tonight to bring attention to the good work of Peerless Rockville, which has restored, renovated and preserved buildings like Frieda's Cottage for all residents to enjoy, at NO COST TO THE CITY, other than the annual grant which supports the administrative function and an office in the historic Red Brick Courthouse. I ask that you consider maintaining previous funding levels for Peerless Rockville, and not accept the budget proposal's large cut to Peerless Rockville in the City's proposed budget.

As you know, Peerless also runs programs at Glenview Mansion, in Town Center, and online for residents to learn about the City's expansive history going back to the early 1800's and before, when it was simply known as Hungerford's Tavern, and then Montgomery Courthouse before incorporation. Peerless provides important services for all residents and works closely with the City's preservation planner to be sure our City's historic resources are recognized and respected as we all move forward.

**Margaret Magner – Testimony about Oral History Work
Rockville FY27 Budget Public Hearing, 23 March 2026**

My name is Margaret Magner, and I live in Rockville. I'm here tonight to talk about work I'm currently doing as a volunteer for Peerless Rockville: digitizing, transcribing and cataloguing oral histories about Rockville in the time immediately following the Brown v. Board of Education decision in 1954.

The Peerless Rockville collection includes dozens of oral history interviews of Rockville residents through the years. Within that collection are a set of interviews that were taped in 2004 to honor the 50th anniversary of the Brown decision. In these tapes, African American residents who were young students, or teachers, or a school administrator in the 1950s, recall their lived experiences as some of the first people to integrate schools in Rockville in that interim period following the Brown decision.

Hearing these stories teaches you about important experience in the history of this area that I didn't know about and was never taught in school. As these brave individuals share their oral histories, the listener hears about a time, for example, when the courthouse in Rockville had water fountains and bathrooms labeled "Whites Only". When the buzz was all over town about a new restaurant called the Hi-Boy that opened on N. Washington Street, but a Black child and his family who went there to try it were told they could not come in; it took sit-ins at the restaurant to change that. And you can hear the courage it must have taken in 1957 for a young child to leave the school friends and teachers they knew, to become one of the few people who looked like them in a sea of white students and teachers at Broome, or Julius West, or Richard Montgomery.

These voices deserve to be preserved, to be heard, and to be made accessible to the public, to scholars, and Rockville residents. Peerless Rockville's small staff makes this possible by providing the archival materials, coordination and framework for this effort – and making use of volunteers like me to stretch every dollar they receive. I volunteer because I feel passionate about preserving these tangible, first person stories, that let you feel the experience and the resilience of people who changed our community for the better. This work is done out of love for our community, and I'm grateful that Peerless provides an umbrella to house and make these important stories available to everyone. Please fund Peerless to the greatest extent possible in the FY27 budget.

Good evening. I am Eileen McGuckian, a long-time supporter and member of Peerless Rockville.

Previous Mayors and Councilmembers have understood the value of Peerless Rockville. In the 1970s they cheered when Peerless led the fight to save the Rockville Railroad Station. In the 1980s they arranged for Peerless to take off the City's hands a little farmhouse once owned by the Dawson family; Peerless found new owners who were willing to repair and restore it, and everyone rejoiced when all loans were repaid and the house lived in again. In the 1990s, Peerless again stepped forward to purchase and save a beloved Rockville landmark -- Wire Hardware Store, near the Metro station. At that time of high interest rates and economic uncertainty, a deadbeat Montrose School tenant drained all resources and the City offered a loan to keep Peerless afloat. That loan was converted into the initial grant in recognition of Peerless Rockville's great value to the City.

Today we are at a similar juncture, of Peerless needing adequate support from the City. Only in 2026, Peerless Rockville's value to Rockville has been proven over a span of more than 50 years.

Why should the City continue to invest in Peerless Rockville?

- * Peerless is a resource for Rockville citizens, nonprofits, students, businesses, and City staff.**
- * Peerless maintains a Rockville visitors center in the handsome Red Brick Courthouse. This service is free and open to the public, with maps, brochures, information, exhibits, and more.**

*** Peerless maintains a Rockville History Museum, Reference Library, and Archives, also at no charge. In addition to the finest staff one can imagine, these two large rooms have files upon files of information about Rockville neighborhoods, events, buildings, churches & synagogues, families, cemeteries, and any Rockville-related topic you can imagine. Thousands of photographs and documents round out the collections that are used by all ages. I hope you will take an hour to visit and look up your neighborhood history or any topic that interests you.**

*** Peerless Rockville provides exemplary programming, virtually and in person. This includes the popular Glenview series, where a huge crowd recently enjoyed a Rockville citizen speak about baseball in Rockville. Programming for this Semiquincentennial year features themes that relate to 1776 (when we became known as Montgomery Courthouse) through the next 250 years. And of course they give great tours.**

*** Peerless Rockville maintains three historic properties in Rockville: a 19th century cemetery, the only historic elementary school still standing, and Rockville's only National Historic Landmark, Frieda's Cottage. Peerless is also a guardian of Montgomery County's 1891 Red Brick Courthouse.**

To drastically cut funding now -- in the middle of both special programming and a construction project during an uncertain economic time, and to deprive Rockville of using the past to understand the present and help to guide our future -- would cause major damage all around.

Our history and the physical evidence of that history are major elements of Rockville's arts and culture. The benefits of today must be allowed sufficient City support to continue into the future.

Good evening, Mayor and Councilmembers,

Thank you for the opportunity to speak tonight. My name is Tara Owens, and I serve as the Executive Director of Main Street. I'm honored to speak in strong support of our FY27 funding request through the Community Services and Enrichment Grant Program.

Main Street is an inclusive community model that was launched in 2020 in response to the lack of housing and social opportunities for community members, which has since become a vibrant hub in Rockville.

As many of you know, Main Street is three things:

- **An accessible apartment building with 70 units—75% affordable, with 25% of those reserved for adults with disabilities.**
- **A community of over 280 members of all abilities**
- **An inclusive employer**

The grant request before you supports one of the most essential aspects of our mission: our **Social Mainstays**—a series of weekly, staff and community facilitated programs that offer safe, affordable, and inclusive social opportunities for adults with all abilities. These programs help participants build relationships, engage with their community, and grow in confidence and independence.

Our Social Mainstays include:

- **Community partnerships with many local Rockville organizations.**
- **Facilitated discussion on civic engagement, health and community issues.**
- **Structured engagement focused on relationship building and guided conversation.**
- **Themed community engagement incorporating arts, culture, music and collaborative activities.**



- Eating out at local Rockville restaurants which has direct economic benefits providing consistent business to restaurants in the City of Rockville, while bringing in members who might not otherwise visit the area are now dining and shopping locally and regularly.

These programs fill a major gap for adults with disabilities. After leaving the school system, many lose access to regular social opportunities. Social Mainstays bring that connection back.

We requested \$28,214 in FY27 grant funding and were recommended for an award of \$25,000, and we are incredibly grateful.

The best way to understand what this funding makes possible is to hear directly from the people it serves.

Jesse a recent Main Street member, captures the spirit of what we have built and states "There's no judgment here. Everyone's welcome, and it helped me feel open to being myself."

A father of another member commented that after his son joined as a member this past year, Main Street has been a foundation of his son's community engagement in Rockville Town Center.

Many community members often refer to Main Street as the HUB for community engagement in the City of Rockville. Bringing the community together is what we are all about.

Thank you all for your time, your support, and your commitment to a more connected Rockville.

"Good afternoon!

My name is Julia Sarmiento, and I am the Maryland Housing Program Manager at the Latino Economic Development Center (LEDC). LEDC serves residents across the DMV by providing the skills and financial tools they need to buy, rent, and sustain their homes, maintain affordable rental housing, and start or expand small businesses.

I am here today to request your support for LEDC's \$40,000 grant application to the City of Rockville, which will allow us to continue and expand tenant services for residents within the City of Rockville.

As the Maryland Housing Program Manager, I oversee a team dedicated to ensuring that Montgomery County tenants understand their rights and responsibilities. Within the City of Rockville, LEDC works directly with tenants facing eviction or other housing hardships, like the shutoff of their utilities or poor living conditions. Our team connects residents to Montgomery County rental assistance programs, as well as local resources and services offered by the City of Rockville.

LEDC has provided housing services in Montgomery County since 2009, and tenant services since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic. Our staff is highly knowledgeable about both city and county rental laws, as well as the social service programs available to tenants and families.

Today, I am advocating for your support of LEDC's grant proposal because this funding will allow us to focus more intentionally on Rockville residents who are facing financial challenges. With this support, we can continue connecting tenants to the resources that help them avoid eviction, prevent utility disconnections, and stabilize their housing situations. LEDC also provides referrals to financial education, budgeting assistance, and credit-building programs both within and beyond our organization, each of which is critical to long-term housing stability. Last year, LEDC helped Ms. Flores, a City of Rockville resident, who had fallen behind on her rent and, despite making payments, was unable to bring her account current. She had been hospitalized due to a back injury, which affected her ability to work consistently.

While Ms. Flores owned a small business that was generating income, she was overspending and lacked a clear understanding of her business finances. LEDC referred Ms. Flores to a small business coach, who helped her organize her finances, develop a profit-and-loss statement, and implement healthy financial behaviors.

Ultimately, Ms. Flores **avoided eviction and stabilized her finances**. Today, she has improved control over her income and is seeing more money remain in her bank account at the end of each month.

This is the type of **holistic, culturally responsive support** LEDC provides to City of Rockville residents. With your support of this application, we can continue helping tenants like Ms. Flores remain housed, financially stable, and on a path toward long-term success.

Mayor Ashton, Council members, city staff,

My name is Kevin Kennedy. When I moved to Rockville in 2022, I was pleased to find active Villages in the City, including one in Rockville Town Center where I live. It's always a challenge these days to connect with neighbors in a new community, particularly since I was working full time at [REDACTED].

[REDACTED] It has been great to be part of Rockville Town Center Village.

I know you all are familiar with the Rockville Villages and I greatly appreciate the support you continue to show. The City had the foresight to hire a full-time facilitator to help City neighborhoods start and grow active Villages, and more recently to add a part-time assistant. With numerous Villages in Rockville in various stages of development, I've been impressed watching Trish Evans and her assistant help the City's Villages move forward.

Rockville Town Center Village has about a dozen people in our informal leadership group, and we've been very active in the last few years with a monthly coffee club, regular Lunch Bunch gatherings, museum outings, a trivia team competing weekly at the World of Beer and many other gatherings. We've run two coat donation drives for Meadow Hall Elementary School families and a drive for toiletries for the County Coalition for the Homeless. We've established a website and a monthly newsletter, which goes out to over 300 people.

While we are volunteer driven, we would not be where we are today without the support of the City's Village staff.

The City's team has also fostered communication and cooperation across the different Villages, with events like this Saturday's Villages Go Green at the Senior Center and the Villages Year in Review in January that a number of you attended.

The City's Village staff also help keep us from reinventing the wheel. When my Village decided to create a survey to scope out residents' interests and needs, Trish pointed us to the similar one West Rockville Connects had done. When Falls Grove Village looked to do a survey, she pointed them to me and our survey.

I applaud the growth and success of other Rockville Villages, and root for the ones just getting off the ground. However, the current staffing level cannot provide all the current and nascent Villages in the City the degree of support that has allowed Town Center Village to thrive. It is just not sustainable. Additional staffing is critical to building on Rockville's progress in growing its Village movement.

You heard recommendations to increase the staffing for the Village program at previous hearings from Elaine Koubek, Chair of the Commission on Aging, and Diane Fuchs, an officer of the West Rockville Connects Village. I echo those recommendations. Shifting the assistant position from its part time to full time in the FY2027 budget would enhance the support the City provides to its Villages. An additional half-time assistant position on top of that would further strengthen the individual Villages and the connections between them.

Dear Mayor Ashton and members of Council,

For more than 50 years, Peerless Rockville has served as the City's primary partner in sharing the history and identity of our community. **We respectfully request that the City fund our community grant at a minimum of \$95,000**, recognizing that even level funding represents an effective decrease of approximately 10% due to inflation and increased operating and financing costs.

The City's 2025 policy change that shifted grant payments to reimbursement after expenses are incurred has required Peerless to borrow funds to meet basic operating needs, including staff salaries. This added financial burden, combined with rising costs, directly impacts our ability to sustain current services.

100% of the community grant supports Peerless Rockville's archival operations, educational programming, and resident/visitor services. These funds enable us to maintain and provide public access to our research library, historical collections of photographs, documents, and records, and to deliver lectures, tours, exhibits, and publications. **No portion of the grant is used for property acquisition or capital preservation projects.**

Peerless performs functions for the city that are typically carried out by government-funded institutions such as archives or historical agencies. In Rockville, these responsibilities have been entrusted to us as a nonprofit partner, and we deliver substantial value to the city. Replicating these services with City staff or contractors would conservatively cost 5 to 10 times more. **For context, the current grant would cover half the salary and benefits of a single senior historian, without accounting for materials, technology, venue or program delivery costs.**

Our archive is an invaluable resource, freely available to residents, researchers, students, journalists, and City departments. Beyond access, we actively engage the community by encouraging residents to contribute materials, participate in programs, and

share their stories. **This work strengthens civic identity, fosters community connection, and enhances Rockville's appeal as a place to live and do business.**

Demand for our programming remains strong. Our lectures, tours, and exhibits reach hundreds in person and thousands more through digital content. These are not simple amenities but **core cultural services that contribute to the City's vitality and sense of place and are not available otherwise.**


As the City is well-aware, general operating costs continue to rise. Expenses for essential infrastructure including archival supplies, collections management systems, and digital tools and platforms have all increased significantly. **Without adequate funding, maintaining professional standards and public access becomes increasingly difficult.**

To sustain current service levels without reduction, Peerless requested \$110,000. **At \$95,000, we will work to bridge the gap through additional volunteer support, though this is not a long-term solution, and leveraging grant-matching opportunities.** Any reduction below \$95,000 will require a measurable decrease in services, programming, and public access.

Peerless Rockville operates as a lean, fiscally conservative organization that multiplies every city dollar through leveraged grant-matching and in-kind contributions. However, **a reduction to below \$95,000 will necessitate cuts to essential resources and experienced staff that are fundamental to our operations. While our volunteers are invaluable, they cannot substitute for the professional expertise and digital tools required to maintain a modern archive.** Sharing and protecting Rockville's history is important for a thriving community today and in the future. Stable funding ensures that this work can continue without disruption.

Thank you for your consideration and for your ongoing support of Peerless Rockville.

Good evening, Madam Mayor and Members of the Rockville City Council.

My name is Robin Yasinow. I'm a Rockville resident and here on behalf of NAMI Montgomery County—the local affiliate of the National Alliance on Mental Illness. As a volunteer and one of the many residents who has personally benefited from their work, I want to express my deep gratitude for the Community Services and Enrichment Grant allocated to NAMI Montgomery County in the proposed FY27 budget.

The City's support ensures that NAMI's peer-led support groups, classes, and resources remain free of charge for residents who are affected by mental health issues. This includes those living with a mental health condition as well as the family members who walk beside them. I happen to be in both categories.

Years ago, despite being in treatment myself, I felt lost when a loved one was diagnosed with a serious mental illness. It felt as though we had been dropped onto a foreign highway without a map. In NAMI's "Family-to-Family" class, I found my bearings. I learned about treatment options and how to provide effective support. But the best part was being with others who were on a similar journey. Together we learned how to navigate this new territory from class leaders who had personal experience.

More than a decade later, NAMI was again invaluable when I faced a mental health crisis of my own. Mental illness affects one in five people, yet it remains incredibly isolating. Through NAMI's "Peer-to-Peer" class and support groups, I connected with people who truly understood what I was going through. Being part of a community has been a cornerstone of my recovery and a powerful antidote to the stigma that surrounds mental health conditions.

Today, the need for these free services is greater than ever. In response to rising demand, NAMI Montgomery County has increased its support groups by nearly 25% this year alone. Between January and March, NAMI held 74 support group meetings; more than half of them were filled beyond capacity.

The City of Rockville's continued support is essential to meeting this growing need and ensuring that no one in our community has to face these challenges alone. Thank you.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide comments on the city's FY'27 budget. We believe the City's budget is an important tool for ensuring the implementation of Rockville's 2022 Climate Action Plan (CAP). The Rockville Environment Commission (REC) is pleased to see a significant part of the FY'27 budget is devoted to reducing carbon pollution by improving the energy efficiency of city buildings, installing solar energy on city properties, and expanding EV charging stations. We fully support these budget items and recommend that the Mayor and Council ensure adequate resources for the City initiatives that will allow the city to be a leader in Maryland's push to achieve a 60% reduction in 2006 emission levels by 2031.

New Building Energy Performance Improvement CIP. The Capital Improvement Plan includes a 5-year goal to spend \$10.3M through 2031 to fund a capital improvement project that improves the energy performance of city buildings, with \$1.5 million allocated in FY 2027. Improving energy efficiency will not only reduce carbon emissions, it will also reduce building energy expenses, freeing up funds to be spent on other city priorities – a win-win. Given the urgency of meeting the city's emissions targets and the potential for operating expense savings from improved energy efficiency, we strongly support the City allocating these resources and believe that these improvements constitute strong investments in the City's future. As a result, any ability for the City to invest more and more quickly in CIP plans to improve building energy performance would be both an environmentally and fiscally sound stewardship of City resources.

Solar on City Properties: The REC supports the building targeted in the budget for solar installations. Their high energy intensity makes them a reasonable choice since cheaper on-site energy will offset more expensive power from the grid. Solar energy production on Rockville properties, with the city owning the solar arrays, allows Rockville to capture not only the environmental benefits but the economic value of 'cost-free' energy once it's paid off, often within 10 years.

Electric vehicles and chargers. The FY'27 budget targeting Fleet Fast Charging stations and installation of Senior Shuttle Bus L2 Charging Stations at the Rothgeb Maintenance Facility, and the installation of 17 public ROW L2 charging ports are good ways to expand EV chargers on city property to serve the city fleet, community, and employees. As with investments in building efficiency, fleet conversion to EVs represents strong stewardship of city resources.

Thank you for your continued support of the Environment Commission and for the opportunity to submit comments on the budget.

**City of Rockville 2027 Budget Hearings
Testimony from the Rockville Recreation and Parks Advisory Board
April 6, 2026**

Hello, Mayor Ashton and Councilmembers. I am speaking tonight on behalf of the City's Recreation and Parks Advisory Board. Over the past few months, we have been discussing the 2027 budget and appreciate the chance to share our thoughts—we've summarized those in a very brief document. Going forward, our goal is to share priorities with Recreation and Parks staff proactively each year and hopefully provide more helpful, forward-looking recommendations.

First, thank you and congratulations to the City for continuing to provide such amazing recreation and parks opportunities to the people of Rockville. A few highlights discussed in our Board's meeting last month:

- More than 1600 kids participated in the City's recreational basketball programs this winter.
- Work is underway to have the outdoor pools ready for the summer and thousands of swimmers, from future Olympians to folks just learning to be safe in the water.
- The flowers and plantings around the City are blooming and looking great.
- We are excited to hear the City applied again for the National Recreation and Park Association's Gold Medal Award; the team for sure deserves the award after being recognized as a finalist last year.

Thank you, too, for your continued support each year in enacting strong budgets for recreation and parks, including last year. This system is a unique jewel for the City and everyone who lives here. Continued investments in the parks, pool, programs, and people make sure we can keep the system doing so much good for so many people. And thank you for adjusting the City's registration approach, giving City residents a two day "head start" to register for City programs; anecdotally, people were shocked they were able to get their kids into camps and swim classes. We understand this slightly reduces revenues by having a greater portion of resident rates vs. non-resident rates in programs, but thank you for this chance to help City residents use City programs.

Now to the details.

This year, we applaud the City's proposal that:

- Prioritizes funding for David Skull Park and Talbott Park. The first is a heavily-used, special place right next to the big community at David Skill Courts. The second is a new park that would serve the big community at West Edmonston and 355 cut off from other City facilities for decades.
- Keeps the ball rolling on the major multi-year and multi-tens of millions of dollars projects at Redgate and the King Farm Farmstead. These are enormous investments for the City and need to be executed well for their own sake and for City's longer-term and broader needs.

- Accelerates consideration of solar and HVAC improvements at City facilities to reduce long-term utility costs, something we likely all see as rising fast in the future.

We also suggest the City:

- Consider greater differentiation in program fees for Rockville residents vs. non-residents, with a goal to prioritize residents while maintaining strong participation and supporting revenue.
- Keep prioritizing the Rockville Swim and Fitness Center, an amazing *very well used* facility. It would be better to move ahead now instead of waiting until 2029 to *study* installing an outdoor bubble.
- Adjust Redgate planning to help get people there safely. Consider a connection to the Rock Creek Trail, a visible hiker/biker entrance at 28 and Gude, and a bridge crossing across 28 to connect Redgate to Croydon Creek and the Civic Center.

Looking ahead, we are fortunate to be in a growing City and to be adding lots of new neighbors in the years ahead. Unlike with previous big development over the past few decades, that growth has the City growing "up, not out." We need to work to provide places for all our new residents to play, recreate, and swim.

**City of Rockville 2027 Budget Hearings
Recreation and Parks Advisory Board Input
Approved March 26, 2026**

Recreation and Parks are a treasure and defining characteristic for the City—the people in the department, the parks and facilities themselves, and the communities of users participate and take care of it all. We need to continue to support a strong budget and plan for Recreation and Parks while looking proactively at ways to adapt and keep creating great spaces and programs for City residents. We support the City's proposed budget in meeting these goals and offer additional comments and points of emphasis for your consideration that bolster work we know the City is already undertaking.

Themes/Priorities:

- Maintain and strengthen Rockville's top tier recreation and parks offerings amid 1) economic challenges affecting the region and City residents and 2) growing City population seeking places to play, swim, etc.
 - o Proactively consider modest changes to the City's historic revenue models, recognizing changing times require changed approaches.
 - o Base plans in knowledge that the City is "growing up but not out," *i.e.*, increasing density but not adding greenspace and parkland as in previous eras of big development.
- Prioritize investments and programs that 1) provide the greatest good for the greatest number of people and 2) support underserved areas and populations.
- Empower residents to take a more active role in parks and recreation, *e.g.*, open more City spaces to community gardens.

Operating Budget:

- Consider greater differentiation in program fees for Rockville residents vs. non-residents, with a goal to prioritize residents while maintaining strong participation and supporting revenue.
- Pursue additional revenue by proactively seeking appropriate and tasteful advertisements in City facilities, including the RSFC.
- Explore new partnerships to encourage high use of City facilities (and cost recapture) akin to the historic affiliations with RBBA and RFL, *e.g.*, pickleball, rugby, lacrosse.

Capital Budget:

- Protect and prioritize funding for David Skull Park and Talbott Park.
- Adjust Redgate planning to include connecting to the Rock Creek Trail (requiring coordination with the County) and a visible entrance from the corner of East Gude and 28; consider including a bridge or safer crossing to help get people to the park safely from Croydon Creek and the Civic Center.
- The RSFC is heavily used. The City's growing population needs additional space and time to swim. The City should evaluate again building a cold season "bubble" for the outdoor fitness pool *and* the potential to build a second municipal pool that could help host major swimming events (and bring in revenue); the City's proposal pushes an evaluation like this to 2029.
- Evaluate usage of baseball and softball fields and consider shifting more quickly to rectangular fields to meet (perceived) greater demand for soccer, lacrosse, frisbee, etc.
- Evaluate opening more City park spaces to community garden use to help build strong relationships between neighbors and address food security. Prioritize underused areas and think of efficient buildout using volunteers and large refillable water tanks instead of new piping.
- Evaluate recreation facilities for HVAC and solar improvements as ways to improve sustainability and reduce costs.

Please consider my comment on two agenda items scheduled for your April 13th meeting: The FY2027 budget proposal and the zoning ordinance rewrite.

First, I commend the City for proposing a budget for FY2027 that funds the Arts in Public Places program over the amount required by the 0.1% set aside. I'm excited to see that the budget proposal recognized the arts as an economic driver with the new proposed pilot program for murals in private development. I also encourage the City to consider if it may be beneficial to set aside funds for expenditures related to seeking an Arts and Entertainment District designation through the Maryland State Arts Council. The Cultural Arts Commission recently recommended that the City pursue this designation and I am encouraged by the positive response from City Manager, Jeff Mihelich, to the CAC on this matter.

Second, I'd like to draw your attention to several considerations related to pursuing an Arts and Entertainment District that may have relevance during discussions about the zoning ordinance rewrite. Specifically, please consider if the following items would be permissible under the proposed zoning ordinances, as these incentives would encourage artists and arts organizations to choose Rockville as an ideal location to live and work:

- Allow artists to live and work in the same space, particularly in industrial or commercial areas, and ensure that such housing is affordable.
- Encourage the conversion of vacant or historic buildings into galleries, studios, or performance venues.
- Permit pop-up galleries, temporary art installations, and performances in public spaces.
- Permit and support retail and restaurant establishments to provide musical performance space.

Future Link offers its thanks to the Mayor and Council for inclusion in the City of Rockville's FY26 Operating Budget and appreciates the recommendation for continued funding for Future Link's Self-Advocacy and Career Development Seminar in the City of Rockville's FY27 Operating Budget. Future Link has been based in Rockville since inception in 2008 and has supported over one thousand first-generation-to-college young adults who are Rockville and County residents on their path to self-sufficiency and economic independence. Specifically, the Seminar equips our resilient young adults with the needed professional development, tools, and career training to achieve their education and early career goals.

Funding from the City of Rockville will continue to grow this first phase of our two-phased program that is held at Montgomery College's Rockville Campus for 30 weeks of the year. The Seminar is the entry point of Future Link's program and serves 90-100 new Montgomery County young adults annually covering career exploration, growth mindset, professional communication, financial literacy, and other foundational skills needed for long-term success. Post-Seminar, students join the remaining 215 of their peers in Phase II, where they receive a personalized education and career plan tailored to their unique goals and gain access to our multi-faceted support services. Through their engagement with Future Link, students work with volunteer professionals who serve as Mentors, Career Coaches, and academic tutors, and are eligible for academic scholarships and paid internships.

Future Link's home in the City of Rockville is pivotal to our operational success. Our office was intentionally chosen as it is across from the Rockville metro and bus hub and near Montgomery College. We entered a formal partnership with Montgomery College over a decade ago which equips us with Seminar classroom space, matching scholarship funds, and student financial aid and academic data. Future Link's supportive community consists of 315+ volunteers, of whom approximately 50 reside or work in Rockville's city limits, and contribute to our program as Mentors, Career Coaches, academic tutors, and budget coaches. Future Link is a member of the Greater Rockville Chamber of Commerce.

Program participants stay with Future Link for an average of 4.25 years, with some staying with us for a decade. Therefore, a City of Rockville investment makes a lasting difference producing strong short- and long-term outcomes in academic persistence, degree attainment, internship experience, and career entry. Future Link thanks the Mayor and Council for the opportunity to equip this area's young professionals with skills, confidence, and competence. Together, we strengthen the community that we love and share.

For over half a century, the award-winning, non-profit Peerless Rockville has played an outsized role in changing positively the mindset and landscape of our city. This small cost-effective group has a long history of providing intelligent and elegant solutions to improve the historic character, environment, and amenities of Rockville. Peerless Rockville's track record is unmatched by any other group in the City for long-lasting and cost-effective improvements to the fabric of Rockville. This is not an opinion but rather a long-established fact.

Our community, the Cambridge Walk II community, is dumbfounded by the proposal to reduce the City's funding to Peerless Rockville, unmatched by neighboring cities. The current budget constraints are indeed difficult, especially when the future prognosis for the economy of the City is so uncertain. But cuts to one the City's most cost-effective and time tested organizations is counter-productive.
