




✓ RedGate and Civic Center Parks: 1973, 61.95 acres, Acquisition, \$441,903








✓ Woottons Mill Park: 1974, 4.33 acres, Acquisition, \$48,244

LWCF Grantee Compliance and Commitments

The Land and Water Conservation Fund is intended to create and maintain a nationwide legacy of quality public outdoor recreational resources as well as to stimulate non-federal investments in the purchase, development, maintenance and protection of these highly valued outdoor recreational areas. Per section 6(f)(3) of the Land and Water Conservation Fund Act, "No property acquired or developed with assistance under this section shall, without the approval of the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, be converted to other than public outdoor recreation uses."

Declaration of the area for outdoor recreational use in perpetuity.

Increase the number of protected State, tribal, and local outdoor recreation resources and to ensure their availability for public use in perpetuity.



LWCF Grantee Compliance and Commitments

Development/Rehabilitation – Projects involving the creation, improvement, or restoration of public outdoor recreation facilities, including:

- Development of new outdoor recreation amenities or facilities.
- Renovation or enhancement of existing outdoor recreational infrastructure.
- Design and construction work associated with these improvements.
- Multiple development projects within the same park may be included under one grant application



LWCF Future Funding

- 2025 Round 1 Funding Approved \$1.5 million (If accepted by Mayor and Council)
- 2025/2026 Round 2 LWCF Grant Application, City requested \$1.2 million for design and construction of multiuse/nature trails, deck overlook, and arboretum features.



Outcome

- If the city does not accept the Round 1 funding, the city will not be in good standing
 with the National Park Service and Maryland's Department of Natural Resources for
 future competitive grants. LWCF Round 2 process will be abandoned.
- Potentially affecting future grant opportunities.



LWCF Round 1 Implementation Update

- Pre Design June 2025 to January 2026
- Design and Permitting February 2026 to February 2027
- Pre Construction February 2027 to July 2027
- Construction July 2027 to July 2028
- Substantial Completion October 2028 If needed, grant allows an extension request.

LWCF Round 2 (\$1.2 million)

- April 2026 Mayor and Council Approval (expected award September 2026)
- Design and construction of multiuse/nature trails, deck overlook, arboretum features.



Recommended Action

- Acceptance of \$1.5 million LWCF Grant
- Suggested Motion: I move to accept the \$1,500,000 Land and Water Conservation Fund Grant for RedGate Park and Arboretum.
