RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends approval of the proposal to install a 10' x 12' shed in the rear yard. The work will meet the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation #9 and Technical Brief #16: Accessory Structures.

Project Summary

The applicant proposes to replace the existing deteriorated shed with a new 10' x 12' shed.

HISTORIC SIGNIFICANCE

The Hayes residence was built c. 1896 and it is an individually designated historic site in East Rockville, having been nominated by the owners in 2003. It is an example of modest Vernacular Queen Anne architecture and is significant as one of the first homes built within the Rockville Park subdivision. The front of the house is original with a small modification at the front porch. The two-story rear and side are late-Twentieth century additions. The original wood German siding has been covered with asbestos shingles, and the addition is covered with vinyl siding. The property received approval to install solar panels on the rear addition in 2015 (HDC2015-00749).

DISCUSSION OF THE PROPOSED PROJECT AND MATERIALS

The applicant proposes to replace a shed at the rear southwest corner of the property. The existing 8' x 10' shed must be removed due to severe deterioration. The applicant proposes to construct a new 11' wide x 13' long concrete foundation. The new foundation will be a 4" thick concrete slab designed to support the 10 x12 shed, with a 1' overhang on all sides for stability and drainage. The proposed shed will be positioned 6' away from both the side and rear fences.

The proposed custom A-Frame shed will be 10' wide x 12' long x 8' high. The wood framed shed will be clad in white T-11 vertical siding, with white trim. The proposed shed will have intersecting front and side gable roofs clad in 30 year asphalt shingles. Facing the applicant's house on the west elevation, there will be a wood 54" double door beneath the gable. A single door will be located beneath the gable on the north side elevation facing the rear yard. The single door will be flanked by stationary windows with shutters. Both barn style doors will multi-lite transoms. The white paint and black roof colors will match the house.

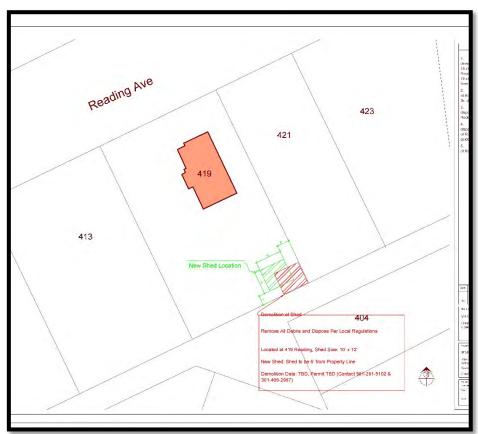

ANALYSIS AND FINDINGS

In accordance with the Secretary of Interiors Standards for Rehabilitation #9, "New additions, exterior alterations, or related new construction will not destroy historic materials, features, and spatial relationships that characterize the property. The new work will be differentiated from the old and will be compatible with the historic materials, features, size, scale and proportion, and massing to protect the integrity of the property and its environment."

The proposed shed at the rear of the property, will be obviously new and the materials will differentiate it from the old. It will be located at the rear where existing shed is located. As a result, it will not destroy historic features and spatial relationships, and it will be compatible with the existing features of the property. Therefore, the proposed addition of the new shed meets the *Secretary of Interiors Standards for Rehabilitation Standard #9.*

Technical Brief #16: Accessory Structures states:

"New garages, sheds and other accessory structures should be located in rear yards and in traditional relationship with (typically behind) the primary building. It is not appropriate to locate a garage or outbuilding in front of or alongside a main building unless it is historically accurate for a specific site."

"New garages and outbuildings must use architectural styles, roof forms and slopes, details, materials, textures and colors that are compatible with, but do not necessarily replicate, those of the principal structure."

"Pre-fabricated sheds and similar simple modern structures should be painted to coordinate with the colors on the main building and to be unobtrusive. Sheds should be simple structures with a minimum of decorative features. They should be sited and landscaped to be minimally visible, if visible at all, from the right-of-way. Metal sheds are discouraged."

The proposal meets the requirements of *Technical Brief #16*.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends approval of the proposal to install a 10' x 12' shed in the rear yard. The work will meet the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation #9 and Technical Brief #16: Accessory Structures.

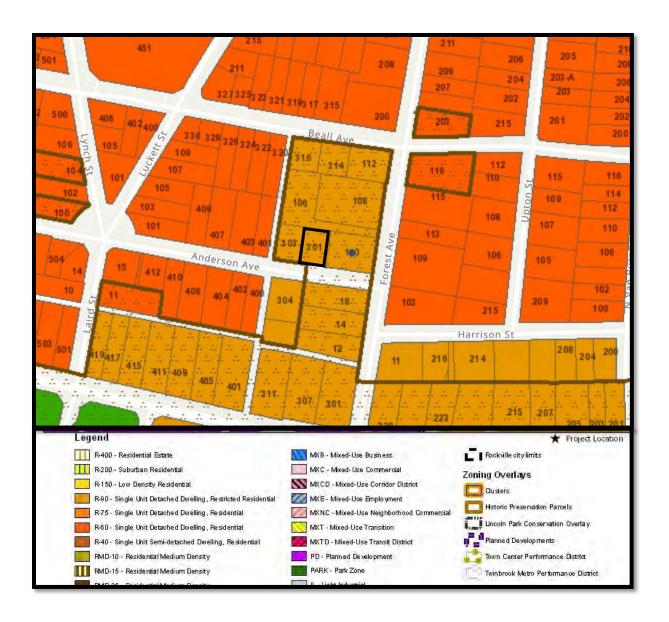

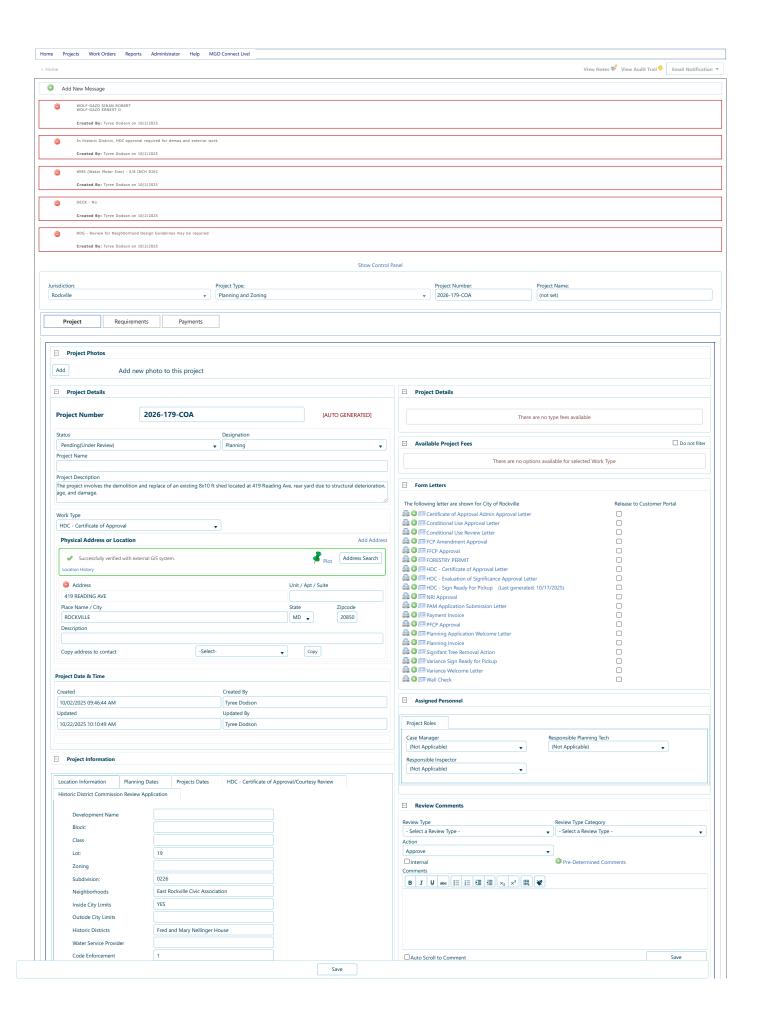
SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR'S STANDARDS FOR REHABILITATION

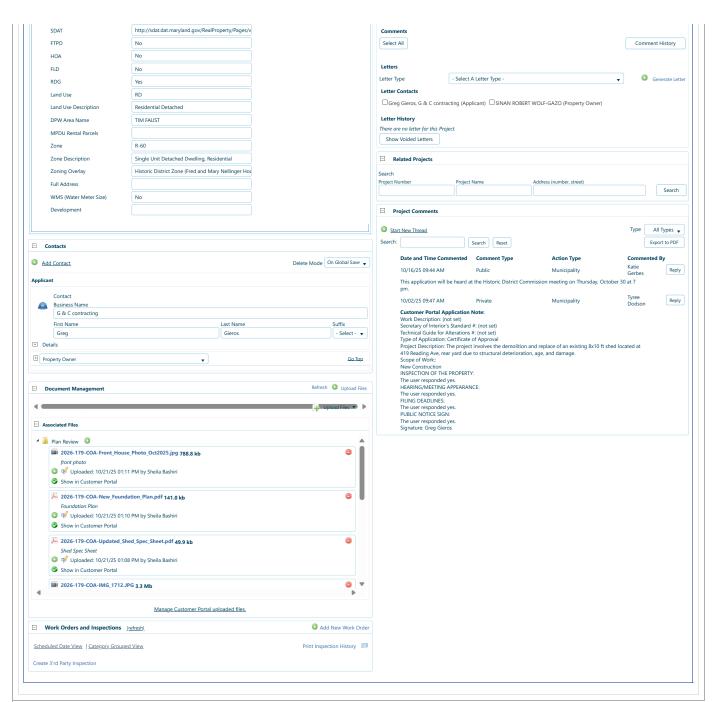
1. A property will be used as it was historically or be given a new use that requires minimal change to its distinctive materials, features, spaces, and spatial relationships.

- 2. The historic character of a property will be retained and preserved. The removal of distinctive materials or alteration of features, spaces, and spatial relationships that characterize a property will be avoided.
- 3. Each property will be recognized as a physical record of its time, place, and use. Changes that create a false sense of historical development, such as adding conjectural features or elements from other historic properties, will not be undertaken.
- 4. Changes to a property that have acquired historic significance in their own right will be retained and preserved.
- 5. Distinctive materials, features, finishes, and construction techniques or examples of craftsmanship that characterize a property will be preserved.
- 6. Deteriorated historic features will be repaired rather than replaced. Where the severity of deterioration requires replacement of a distinctive feature, the new feature will match the old in design, color, texture, and, where possible, materials. Replacement of missing features will be substantiated by documentary and physical evidence.
- 7. Chemical or physical treatments, if appropriate, will be undertaken using the gentlest means possible. Treatments that cause damage to historic materials will not be used.
- 8. Archeological resources will be protected and preserved in place. If such resources must be disturbed, mitigation measures will be undertaken.
- 9. New additions, exterior alterations, or related new construction will not destroy historic materials, features, and spatial relationships that characterize the property. The new work will be differentiated from the old and will be compatible with the historic materials, features, size, scale and proportion, and massing to protect the integrity of the property and its environment.
- 10. New additions and adjacent or related new construction will be undertaken in such a manner that, if removed in the future, the essential form and integrity of the historic property and its environment would be unimpaired.

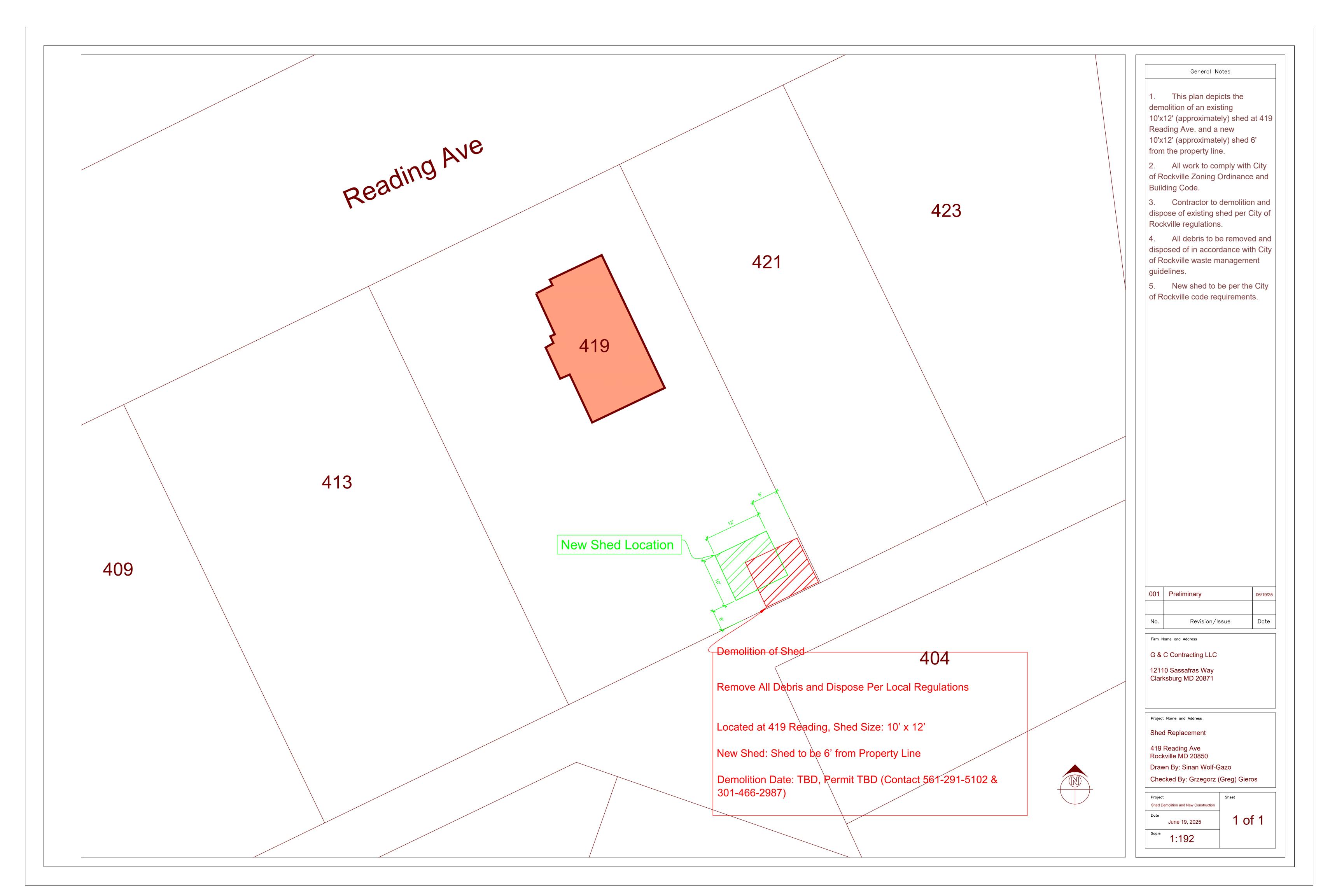




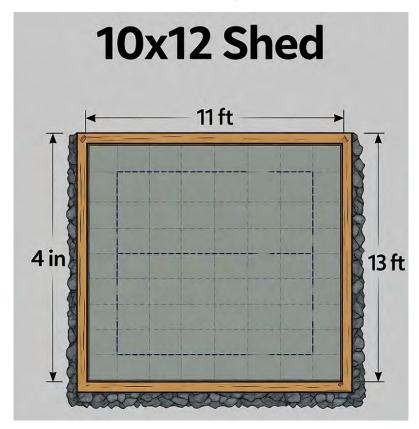

The new foundation will be a 4-inch-thick concrete slab designed to support the 10x12 shed, with a 1 ft overhang on all sides for stability and drainage.

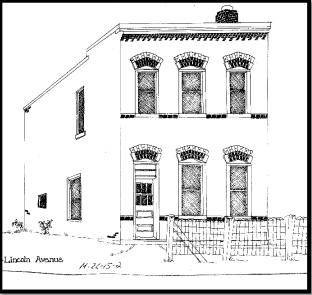

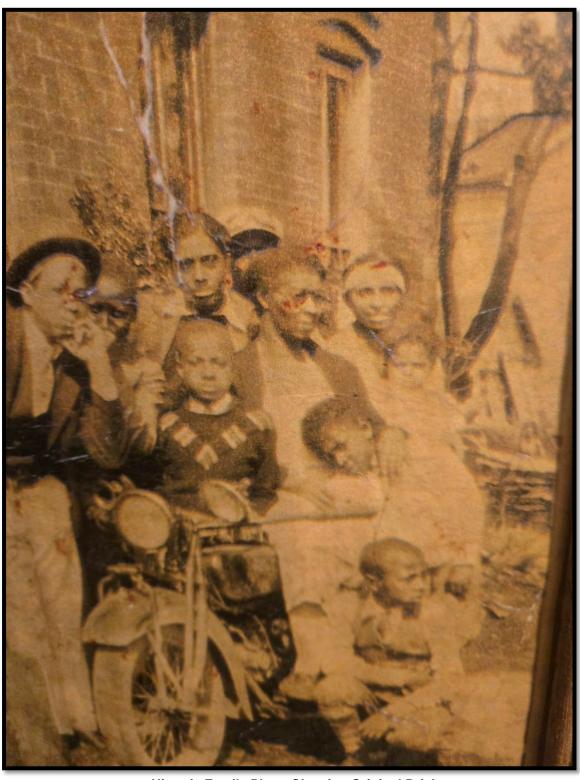

HISTORIC SIGNIFICANCE

302 Lincoln Avenue is a two-story brick house built in 1894-95. Identified with the Reuben Hill family and the Cook family, Reuben Hill was a prominent enslaved person that served in the Civil War and purchased land near the present community of Lincoln Park after emancipation. The Cook-Waters-Lewis House is named for the African American families who have lived here. This unique urban townhouse was built by George and Fannie Hill Cook (Reuben Hill's daughter) in what was then the new Lincoln Park subdivision. George and Fannie were considered among the first settlers of the Community.

The Italianate building has decorative brick details on the front facade at the cornice, and over the window and door openings. There is a corbelled cornice line on the front elevation. This stuccoed two-story house was built on fieldstone foundations, with stretcher bonded bricks painted light pink. The south door is glass and wooden paneled. The house currently one-overone double-hung windows, however, the window sashes have been changed several times since 1894. There is an interior end chimney on the north elevation. The house was locally designated in 2006.

DISCUSSION OF THE PROPOSED PROJECT AND MATERIALS

The applicant proposes to rehabilitate the house which has been vacant for a long time. The applicant seeks to begin rehabilitating the house by replacing the windows, repairing the back porch, repairing doors and adding a new rear doorway, adding a roof membrane, and removing the chimneys.

Windows

The original wood windows have been changed several times since the house was constructed in 1894. The existing windows are one-over-one double-hung vinyl. The vinyl windows show varying levels of deterioration. The wood window frames are in various stages of severe deterioration. The applicant proposes to replace the vinyl windows with a new composite vinyl window. The proposed new double-hung windows will have a two-over-two configuration. Simonton 5500 Traditional Style windows are proposed to replace the existing vinyl windows. The proposed windows will have simulated divided lites (SDL). The wood window frames will be repaired, and the new windows and the frames will be painted to match he existing windows.

Doors

The house retains the original front (south) and east side elevation doors. The six-lite recessed wood panel doors are deteriorated and in need of repair. The applicant proposes add a new door on the rear (north) elevation. The proposed new door will be placed directly beneath the east end second story window. The existing bricks will be removed to open the doorway, and the new doorway will be arched to mimic the existing north elevation window. The proposed new 26 x 68 door will duplicate the front and side doors, with a four-lite confifugraion. A set of two steps will lead to the proposed new door.

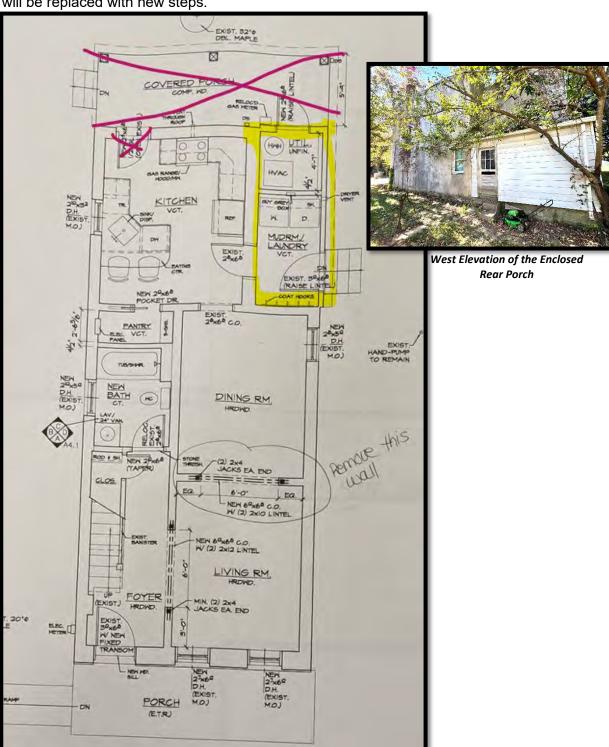

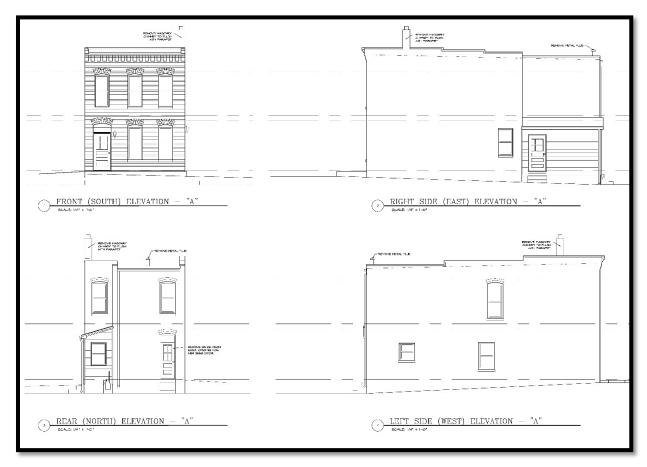
The existing rear porch was enclosed with wood siding. The existing porch is structurally sound, so the applicant intends to restore it as needed. The concrete block steps on the west elevation will be replaced with new steps.

Roof and Chimneys

As typical in Italianate style buildings, the existing roof of the house is flat. A brick chimney rises above the roof near the front elevation, and a metal pipe chimney is above the rear end. The applicant proposes to remove the two chimneys and seal the openings. A rubber membrane will be applied to the roof to seal the building.

ANALYSIS AND FINDINGS

The Secretary of Interiors Standards for Rehabilitation Standard #9, states: "New additions, exterior alterations, or related new construction will not destroy historic materials, features, and spatial relationships that characterize the property. The new work will be differentiated from the old and will be compatible with the historic materials, features, size, scale and proportion, and massing to protect the integrity of the property and its environment."

The proposed windows will meet *Standard #9*. The existing vinyl replacement windows are not original to the house. The proposed new windows will be two-over-two configuration, which is much more appropriate for the house style. The window material will distinguish them as a new element.

The proposed new door will be compatible with the historic features of the house. The location at the rear of the house will not impact the historic features that characterize of the house and the new work will be differentiated from the old.

The City's Technical Guide for Alterations #3, Windows and Doors:

- Retain and repair original windows and doors and their frame and trim.
- Retain the location of original window and door openings to the maximum extent possible.
- Retain the size of the original openings and configurations, with transoms, sidelights, double doors or other features.

If the HDC approves the replacement of one or more of the original windows or doors, the replacement shall be in kind, matching the original in design, size, and materials. Windows in new additions are evaluated as "new construction" and repair of original materials would not apply.

The work meets the requirements of Technical Guide #3, Windows and Doors.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends approval of the proposal replace windows, repair the doors and add a rear doorway, repair the back porch, add a roof membrane, and remove the chimneys. The work will meet the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation #9 and Technical Brief #3: Windows and Doors.

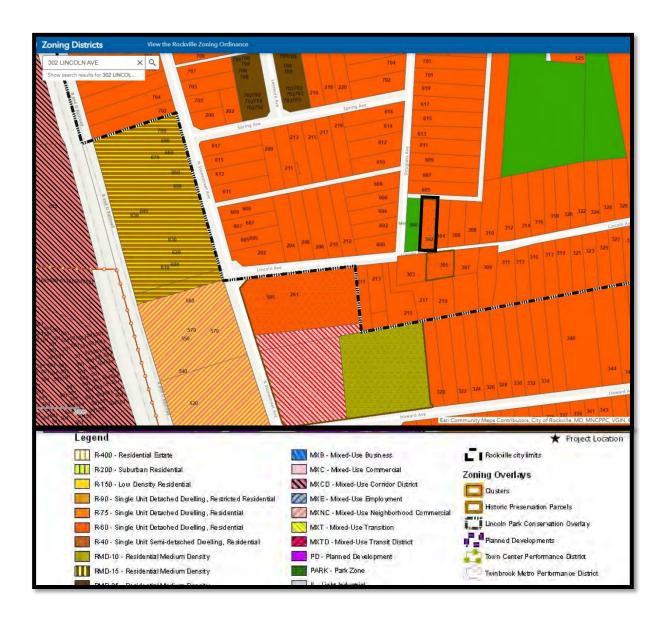
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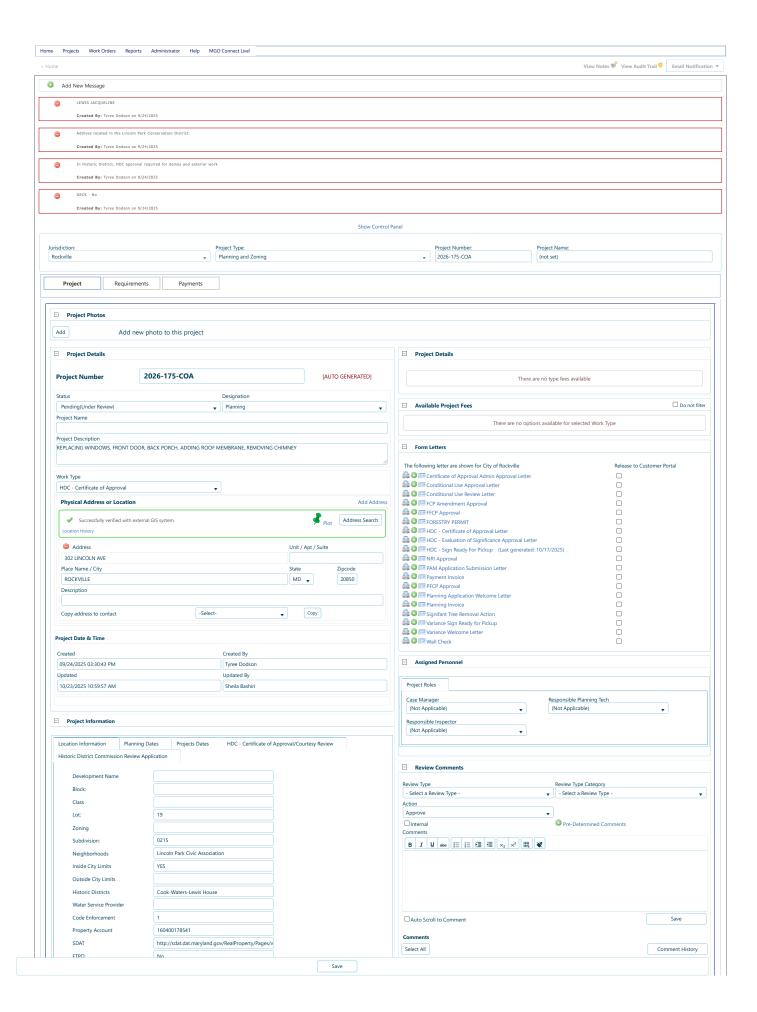
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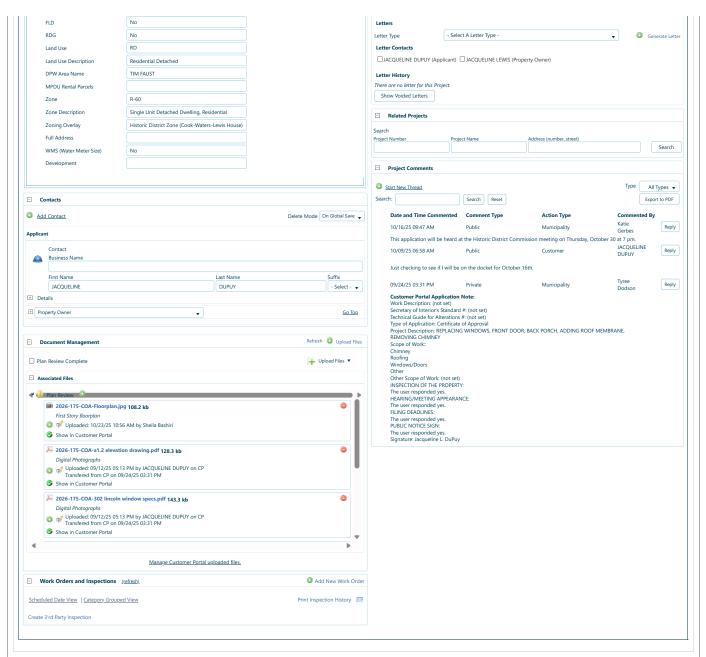

This 1894 three bay by two bay, two story rectangular town house faces south on Lincoln Avenue. It is a rectangular frame and brick building with a regular façade and a flat roof. It is in good condition with no structural cracks visible in the foundation or walls. There is some wood deterioration in the window sills. Several window openings (on the west and rear facades) have been altered or closed. The windows have been replaced several times and the rear porch enclosed. A hand pump is in the east side yard. Despite these alterations over time, the presence of the building and its appearance from the public way is essentially unchanged from the original.



Built on fieldstone foundations, this stretcher bonded brick structure is painted light beige; its east and west elevations are stuccoed. There is a poured concrete slab across the south elevation. The south exterior front door has six lights on top and two wooden panels below. The sides of the building are largely unrelieved.

There are one-over-one double-hung windows. On the south elevation these windows are set into segmental arches of decorative bricks with raised ball design. It has a raised brick beltcourse between the first and second story and under the first story windows on the front façade. The house has a shed roof with a tin and tar covering. There is a corbelled cornice line on the south elevation and a corbelled interior chimney on the east elevation.

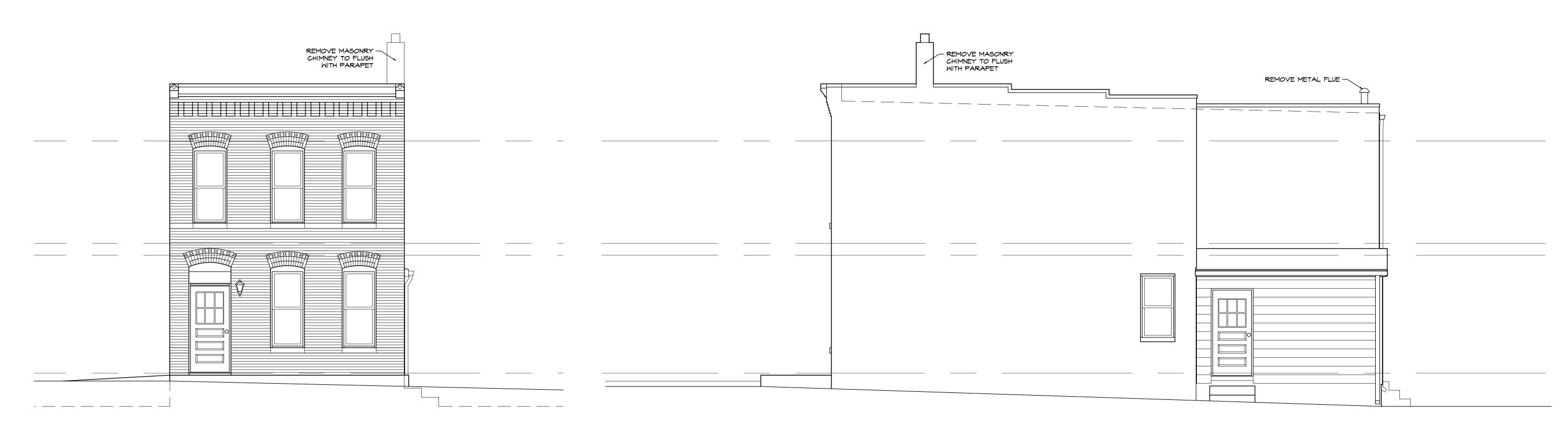

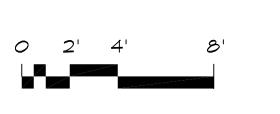

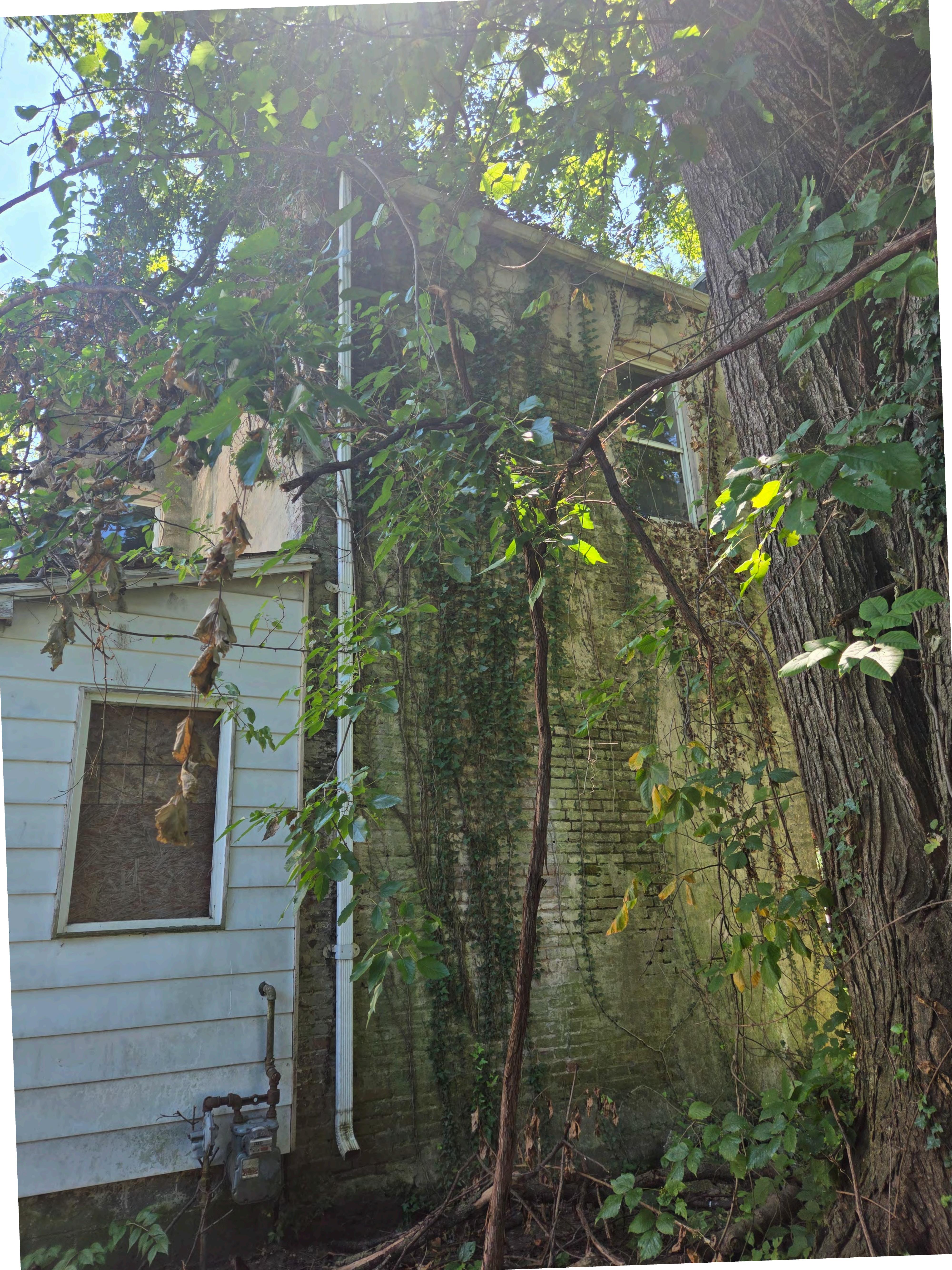

RECOMMENDATION

Finding that the proposal to retain the half-court sports court does not meet the *Secretary* of the *Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation* #1, #2, #9 and #10, staff does not recommend approval.

Project Summary

The applicant is seeking a retroactive Certificate of Approval to retain the half-court sports court in the side yard of the property. The applicant is not requesting any alterations to the existing condition.

HISTORIC SIGNIFICANCE

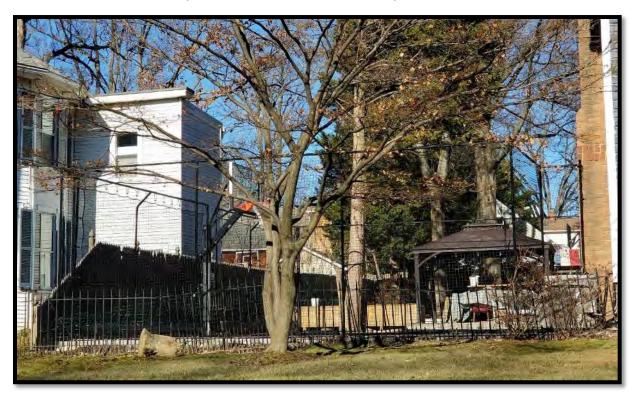
This two and one-half story wood framed house was constructed in 1890 by Charles B. and Lavinia Lyddane Jones and appears in H. Copp's 1890 promotional brochure archived with Peerless Rockville. It sits on the original half-acre of land as originally platted. Mr. Jones served on the Rockville City Council from 1890 to 1892. The property remained in the Jones family until 1958, at which point it was purchased by Joseph and Margaret Ilgenfritz. Mr. Ilgenfritz was the head of the License and Inspections Department in Washington, D. C.

The house faces south on a half-acre lot with several mature trees. The north-south alley directly east of the property serves as the property's driveway and provides access to the east-west alley behind the house. This alley also provides access to the historic carriage house and 1987 garage at the northeast corner of the property. From 1958-1960, the Ilgenfritzs worked with architect Eldred Mowrey, to "modernize" the house, converting it from a Second Empire to a Georgian Revival. Alterations included truncating the center square bay tower, removal of the front porch and steps, and construction of the existing brick split porch stoop. The house has a tall standing seam hipped roof with tall chimneys

that rise above the gabled dormers on the east and west sides of the house. It has a center gable on the front elevation, which rests on a flat roof of the portico. The north elevation includes three additions which had a gabled roof, a flat roof, and a shed roof. In 2021, the flat and shed roofs were replaced with a single standing seam hipped roof which extends over the existing patio (HDC2021-01004).

SPORTS COURT BACKGROUND

On January 10, 2023, Code Enforcement staff became aware of a concrete half-court basketball court surrounded by netting at least 10' high abutting the fence had been installed on the west side of the yard. This work was completed before receiving a COA from the HDC or a fence permit from the Permits & Inspections Division.

On January 13, 2023, the property owner applied for a retroactive COA for the construction of the basketball court (HDC2023-01105). The HDC reviewed the application at their February 16, 2023 meeting. The HDC voted to deny the application. On February 27, 2023, the Chief of Zoning issued a denial letter to the applicant which detailed the reasons for the HDC's denial. The applicant was advised that the decision could be appealed to the Circuit Court for Montgomery County, Maryland within 30 days of receipt of the denial letter. The letter explained that the applicant could submit a new application for a Certificate of Approval to bring the property into compliance. Additionally, should the

applicant fail to get a Certificate of Approval to bring the property into compliance, the half-court basketball court would be required to be removed from the side yard of the property.

The appeal option was not pursued, and the 30-day window expired. The Chief of Zoning issued a Notice of Violation (NOV) to the applicant on April 12, 2023. The NOV informed the applicant of two timelines for bringing the property into compliance. The City gave the applicant 90 days from the date of the Notice letter to apply for a revised Certificate of Approval for a plan to bring the property into compliance by July 11, 2023. Failure to do so would result in the City issuing citations and seeking compliance via removal of the half-court basketball court through a Court order.

If the revised COA application is approved, the applicant would have 90 days from the issuance of the Approval Letter to make the improvements that would bring the property into compliance. If the work was not completed by October 9, 2023, the City would issue citations and seek removal of the half-court basketball court through a Court order.

On May 12, 2023, the applicant submitted two applications for HDC Review: an application for a Certificate of Approval to replace fencing and install landscaping, and an application for a Courtesy Review to retain the half-court basketball court with changes to make it less visible.

The HDC held two reviews for the property at their June 15, 2023 meeting. The HDC approved a COA for the installation of landscaping, and the replacement of the existing fencing (HDC2023-01131).

A Courtesy Review for the half-court basketball court was also held. The proposal for the basketball court included planting evergreen privacy trees along fence in front of the basketball court, moving the basketball hoop and rebounding net to the opposite side of the court, and reducing the height of the three side nets and posts to 8', or removing the net completely (HDC2023-01130). The HDC discussed the proposal and provided the applicants with their suggestions based on the required standards and guidelines.

In the April Notice of Violation letter, the City reserved the right to grant an extension of the timeline. After the June 15, 2023 meeting, the applicant requested and was granted an extension. The City extended the applicant's deadline to October 20, 2023, to receive a Certificate of Approval from the Historic District Commission for a plan to bring the basketball court into compliance. If the applicant failed to get a COA for a plan that will bring the property into compliance as approved by the HDC by October 20, 2023, the City will issue citations and seek compliance via removal of the half-court basketball court through a Court order. Additionally, the applicant was given until December 31, 2023, to make changes to the property that would bring it into compliance with the Certificate of Approval, if approved by the HDC. Failure to do so will result in the City issuing citations and seeking compliance and removal of the basketball court through a Court order.

On September 15th, 2023, the applicant applied for a Certificate of Approval for the basketball court with the same modifications detailed in the June 15, 2023 Courtesy Review (see description above). The HDC reviewed the proposal at their October 19,

2023 meeting and the HDC voted to deny the application. A denial letter was sent to the applicant on October 24, 2023 summarizing the HDC's decision.

Following the October 2023 decision of the Historic District Commission, the applicant elected to enact their right to appeal the HDC's decision to the Circuit Court for Montgomery County, Maryland. A petition for judicial review was filed by the applicant on November 27, 2023. After several months of legal activity tied to the petition for judicial review, the applicant dropped their petition on March 6, 2024. The case did not make it to trial or before a judge before it was dropped.

During a routine inspection of the subject property on May 22, 2024, a City inspector found that the concrete slab from the unapproved half-court sports court remained on the property. Per the Notice of Violation dated April 12, 2023, the entirety of the unapproved alteration was to be removed from the site due to lack of approval by the HDC. Seeing that the alteration had not been removed, the city issued another Notice of Violation to the applicant on June 3, 2024. The Notice of Violation gave the property owner until August 2, 2024 to restore the concrete pad to its original condition of a grassy side yard. A site visit to the subject property on August 20, 2024 confirmed that the concrete pad had not been removed.

In May 2025, the City discovered that the applicant had returned the sports court to its prior state, by reinstalling the court flooring and basketball hoop. Consequently, the Chief of Zoning issued a Uniform Civil Citation on June 27, 2025, which issued a fine, as well as sought abatement of the site to its original condition. Applicant requested hearing before a judge on the citation on July 17, 2025. On August 21, 2025, City was notified that a trial date was scheduled for October 7, 2024. On October 7, 2025, a power outage at the Circuit Court building forced the rescheduling of the trial date to November 4, 2025.

CURRENT PROPOSAL

On September 22, 2025, the applicant submitted Certificate of Approval Application 2026-166-COA to retain the half-court sports court. The applicant is seeking a retroactive approval of the sports court in its existing condition. The applicant is not proposing any alterations to the court at this time.

ANALYSIS AND FINDINGS

The analysis and findings are based on the applicant's proposal obtain a retroactive Certificate of Approval to retain the half-court sports court in the side yard. The applicable Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation and the Technical Guides for Exterior Alterations must be taken into consideration.

The Secretary of Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation Standard No. 1 states: "A property will be used as it was historically or be given a new use that requires minimal change to its distinctive materials, features, spaces, and spatial relationships." The basketball court represents a new use that severely altered the distinctive materials, features, spaces, and spatial relationships of the property. The applicant's proposal does not address any remedies for these factors.

The Secretary of Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation Standard No. 2 states: "The historic character of a property will be retained and preserved. The removal of distinctive materials or alteration of features, spaces and spatial relationships that characterize a property will be avoided." The installation and the current location of the basketball court changed the character of the property. The side yard was an important feature of this historic property. The distinctive features, spaces, and spatial relationships of the historic properties and the historic district were impacted with the installation of the basketball court in the side yard. The current application won't alleviate this issue.

The Secretary of Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation Standard No. 9 states: "New additions, exterior alterations, or related new construction will not destroy historic materials, features, and spatial relationships that characterize the property. The new work will be differentiated from the old and will be compatible with the historic materials, features, size, scale and proportion, and massing to protect the integrity of the property and its environment." The installation of the sports court is clearly differentiated from the older, original components of the house. However, the dense side yard was a character defining feature of the historic property. In its current location, the basketball court is not sensitive to the character and setting of the historic district.

The Secretary of Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation Standard No. 10 states: "New additions and adjacent or related new construction will be undertaken in such a manner that, if removed in the future, the essential form and integrity of the historic property and its environment would be unimpaired." The basketball court and all the changes that were made to install it, were not undertaken in such a manner that would leave the property unimpaired. Since landscaping was removed to make way for the court, it is not easily reversible; however, it can begin to be reversed with the removal of the basketball court, and grading and sodding the impacted area.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

The posting of the notification sign on the property occurred two weeks prior to the meeting, and the notices were sent out two weeks prior to the meeting.

RECOMMENDATION

Finding that the proposal to retain the half-court sports court does not meet the *Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation* #1, #2, #9 and #10, staff does not recommend approval.

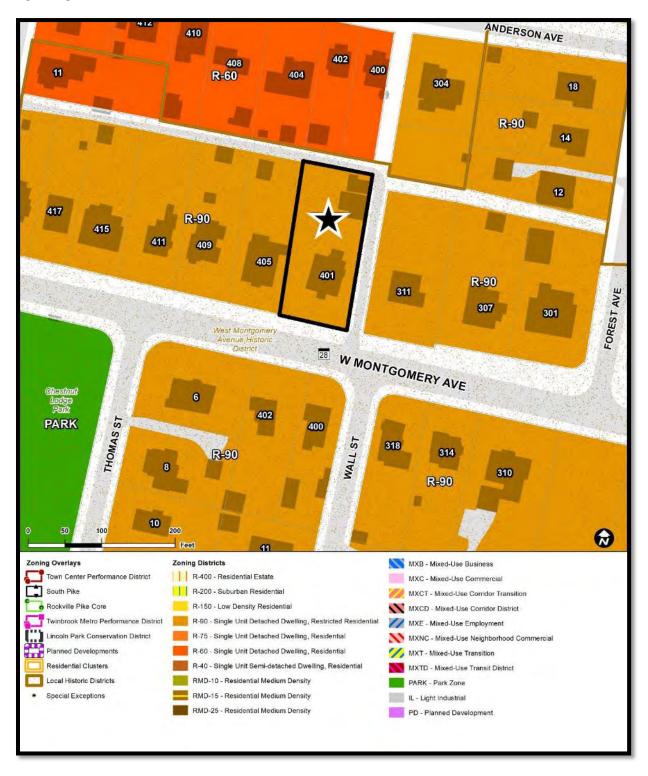

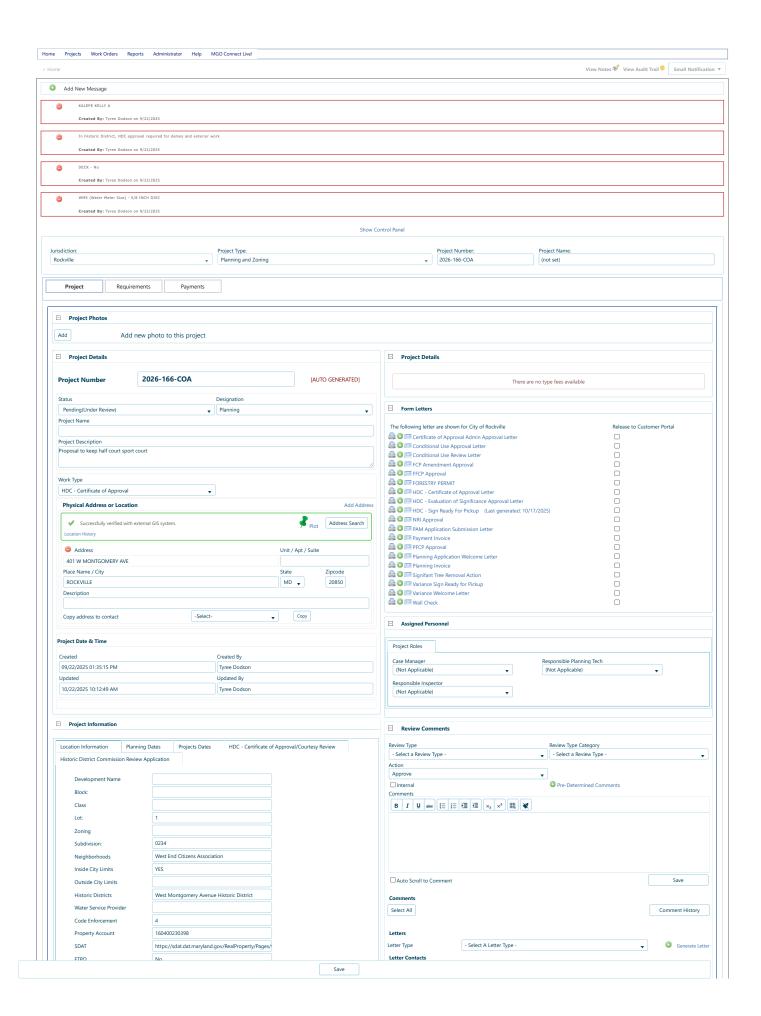
- 1. A property will be used as it was historically or be given a new use that requires minimal change to its distinctive materials, features, spaces, and spatial relationships.
- 2. The historic character of a property will be retained and preserved. The removal of distinctive materials or alteration of features, spaces, and spatial relationships that characterize a property will be avoided.
- 3. Each property will be recognized as a physical record of its time, place, and use. Changes that create a false sense of historical development, such as adding conjectural features or elements from other historic properties, will not be undertaken.
- 4. Changes to a property that have acquired historic significance in their own right will be retained and preserved.
- 5. Distinctive materials, features, finishes, and construction techniques or examples of craftsmanship that characterize a property will be preserved.
- 6. Deteriorated historic features will be repaired rather than replaced. Where the severity of deterioration requires replacement of a distinctive feature, the new feature will match the old in design, color, texture, and, where possible, materials. Replacement of missing features will be substantiated by documentary and physical evidence.
- 7. Chemical or physical treatments, if appropriate, will be undertaken using the gentlest means possible. Treatments that cause damage to historic materials will not be used.
- 8. Archeological resources will be protected and preserved in place. If such resources must be disturbed, mitigation measures will be undertaken.
- 9. New additions, exterior alterations, or related new construction will not destroy historic materials, features, and spatial relationships that characterize the property. The new work will be differentiated from the old and will be compatible with the historic materials, features, size, scale and proportion, and massing to protect the integrity of the property and its environment.
- 10. New additions and adjacent or related new construction will be undertaken in such a manner that, if removed in the future, the essential form and integrity of the historic property and its environment would be unimpaired.

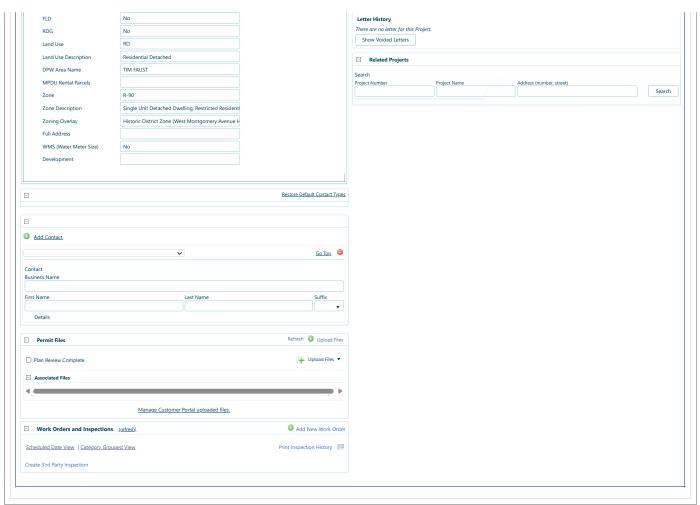

Hello,

We are writing to oppose the application number 2026-166-COA for a retroactive certificate of approval to retain the half-court basketball court (sport Court) in the side yard at 401 W Montgomery Ave (WM).

We live at 405 W Montgomery Ave, immediately to the west of 401 W Montgomery Ave. The location of the sport court is in very close proximity to our property, spanning the entirety of the neighbors' side yard directly up to the 8' fence that separates the two properties and running almost the entire length of both houses. Because our house is situated at an angle on our lot, in some instances the sport court is no more than a few feet away from the house. Attached for your reference is a aerial photo of our two properties showing the location of the sport court in relation to our house and a photo taken from our second floor window overlooking the sport court. It is not the neighbors fault that our house is located so close to the property line, however, the neighbors certainly were aware of this and chose to locate the sport court there anyway.

Originally, the sport court was installed by the neighbors in January of 2023, without prior approval from the HDC. Since then, the neighbors have petitioned four times for retro approval, with the fourth application now pending. Each of the previous three applications have been denied because a modern sport court is out of place sandwiched between two historic houses and negatively affects the historic esthetic of the neighborhood visible from the street and surrounding area.

This fourth application for retro approval is particularly frustrating because after the denial of the third application, and the withdrawal of their appeal to the Circuit Court, the neighbors dismantled the sport court as they were required to do. However, they actually only partially dismantled the sport court and left the approximately 30' x 40' concrete base intact, allowing them to easily reinstall the sport court at a later date. And that's exactly what they did - in the same location on the same concrete pad - they removed it and then they put it back. They did not seek a certificate of approval from the HDC prior to reinstalling the sport court, as they surely knew would be required. Instead, they reinstalled it and have now applied for retro approval,

again, presumably to avoid civil penalties and possibly appeal any new denial to the Circuit Court.

All owners of historic properties in the City of Rockville know, or should know, that any significant change to the exterior of their property, including the yard, requires prior approval by the HDC to ensure that our historic district retains its historic character. That is not to say that retroactive approval of a project is never be appropriate or may never be granted. However, we would ask the HDC, as we have done in the past, to consider granting retro approval only to those projects that would have been approved anyway had the homeowner sought approval beforehand, as he or she is required to do. If the project would have been approved prior to starting work, then it makes sense to grant approval retroactively. However, if the proposed project would never have been approved even if it had been presented prior to construction, then retro approval would not be appropriate and should be denied.

In this particular case, and in response to each previous application, the Commissioners have repeatedly stated to the neighbors that the side yard is not an appropriate location for this type of sport installation. They have also repeatedly stated that this project *would have* been approved had it been located in the **back yard**. Yet the neighbors appear to have no interest in moving the sport court to a different location, despite having a large back yard that could easily accommodate it and knowing that the location in the back yard would be approved. Given the history of this case - the neighbors' repeated applications for the same project, the refusal to relocate the project to the back yard, the outright refusal to abide by the rulings of the HDC, and reinstalling the sport court knowing approval had not been granted – we can only conclude that the neighbors are acting in bad faith.

As a result, we believe that granting retro approval of this fourth application would wipe away all authority of the HDC and send a message to other historic property owners that the rules don't actually apply if you ignore them long enough. All historic property owners must be held to the same standards and cannot be allowed to ignore these standards without consequence. Rules must apply to all, or they should apply to none.

We admit that in the past we have not been so outspoken in our opposition to the first three applications for retro approval. This stemmed from our desire keep good relations with our neighbors, and faith that the process would result in what we believed was the appropriate outcome. Regrettably, that muted response has given the impression to some that we approved of this project or supported it. This is not the case – we have never and will never support the approval of the sport court in its current location in the side yard.

Therefore, we would ask that approval of this application be denied and the applicants be required to remove the sport court in its entirety, including the concrete base, otherwise we have little doubt this never-ending cycle of delay will continue and we'll be here again a year from now for the exact same reason.

Attached for your reference is a aerial photo of our two properties showing the location of the sport court in relation to our house and a photo taken from our second floor window overlooking the sport court. It is not the neighbors fault that our house is located so close to the property line, however, the neighbors certainly were aware of this and chose to locate the sport court there anyway.

Originally, the sport court was installed by the neighbors in January of 2023, without prior approval from the HDC. Since then, the neighbors have petitioned four times for retro approval, with the fourth application now pending. Each of the previous three applications have been denied because a modern sport court is out of place sandwiched between two historic houses and negatively affects the historic esthetic of the neighborhood visible from the street and surrounding area.

This fourth application for retro approval is particularly frustrating because after the denial of the third application, and the withdrawal of their appeal to the Circuit Court, the neighbors dismantled the sport court as they were required to do. However, they actually only partially dismantled the sport court and left the approximately 30' x 40' concrete base intact, allowing them to easily reinstall the sport court at a later date. And that's exactly what they did - in the same location on the same concrete pad - they removed it and then they put it back. They did not seek a certificate of approval from the HDC prior to reinstalling the sport court, as they surely knew would be required. Instead, they reinstalled it and have now applied for retro approval,

again, presumably to avoid civil penalties and possibly appeal any new denial to the Circuit Court.

All owners of historic properties in the City of Rockville know, or should know, that any significant change to the exterior of their property, including the yard, requires prior approval by the HDC to ensure that our historic district retains its historic character. That is not to say that retroactive approval of a project is never be appropriate or may never be granted. However, we would ask the HDC, as we have done in the past, to consider granting retro approval only to those projects that would have been approved anyway had the homeowner sought approval beforehand, as he or she is required to do. If the project would have been approved prior to starting work, then it makes sense to grant approval retroactively. However, if the proposed project would never have been approved even if it had been presented prior to construction, then retro approval would not be appropriate and should be denied.

In this particular case, and in response to each previous application, the Commissioners have repeatedly stated to the neighbors that the side yard is not an appropriate location for this type of sport installation. They have also repeatedly stated that this project *would have* been approved had it been located in the **back yard**. Yet the neighbors appear to have no interest in moving the sport court to a different location, despite having a large back yard that could easily accommodate it and knowing that the location in the back yard would be approved. Given the history of this case - the neighbors' repeated applications for the same project, the refusal to relocate the project to the back yard, the outright refusal to abide by the rulings of the HDC, and reinstalling the sport court knowing approval had not been granted – we can only conclude that the neighbors are acting in bad faith.

As a result, we believe that granting retro approval of this fourth application would wipe away all authority of the HDC and send a message to other historic property owners that the rules don't actually apply if you ignore them long enough. All historic property owners must be held to the same standards and cannot be allowed to ignore these standards without consequence. Rules must apply to all, or they should apply to none.

We admit that in the past we have not been so outspoken in our opposition to the first three applications for retro approval. This stemmed from our desire keep good relations with our neighbors, and faith that the process would result in what we believed was the appropriate outcome. Regrettably, that muted response has given the impression to some that we approved of this project or supported it. This is not the case – we have never and will never support the approval of the sport court in its current location in the side yard.

Therefore, we would ask that approval of this application be denied and the applicants be required to remove the sport court in its entirety, including the concrete base, otherwise we have little doubt this never-ending cycle of delay will continue and we'll be here again a year from now for the exact same reason.

While we understand (and value!) the importance of process, pre-review, and approvals for historic property alterations, in this case we kindly request that the Commission apply balance and discretion when assessing whether any penalty for retroactive approval applies.

From our perspective as neighbors, the Kalepe Family is committed to maintaining a beautiful home -including through landscaping, a protective fence, a well-maintained exterior and tremendous curb
appeal. Nearly every holiday I see their home decorated and bright -- and often hear happy children
around the home playing on the very basketball court at issue. The Kalepe home is well-known and
generally thought of by neighbors as beautiful. These types of homes and neighbors drive potential
new Rockville residents into Rockville when new residents can see homeowners who value their
property/community and who are equally valued by their neighbors. To be clear, the Kalepe home
stands out for all the <u>right</u> reasons on W. Montgomery Avenue and positively contributes to the
beauty of Rockville!

So while we can agree <u>process</u> was not followed in the construction of the basketball court, the <u>Commission decision</u> should fairly take into account:

- All of the positives the Kalepe's have contributed to our neighborhood and our City through their commitment to their home;
- Whether their mistake in installing the basketball court prior to approval warrants levying a costly renovation or destruction of that basketball court in order to satisfy process (i.e, is the home or the property truly <u>at risk</u> from the alteration?)
- Whether any proposed "abatement" requiring the basketball court to either be moved or destroyed "makes sense" -- to us, any proposed positive benefit of an abatement <u>should</u> outweigh the negatives (time, cost, alienation of the homeowner);

- Retained aesthetics: the current privacy fence installed around the basketball court mitigates impact to aesthetics;
- Are there any other mitigation paths that could be explored other than movement or destruction of the basketball court that would cost the homeowner less out of pocket?
- The likelihood that an abatement requiring the basketball court to either be moved or destroyed would come at such a cost to the homeowner that it drives the Kalepe's from our neighborhood/City;
- The impact that a loss of the basketball court might have on the broader neighborhood children.

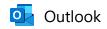
As a long-time resident of the Rockville Historic District, I have great respect for the guidelines and restrictions imposed by the Historic Dictrict Commission. I also have great frustration with those same guidelines and restrictions. Some are clearly meant to preserve the historic nature of the area; and some, it seems, are meant to befuddle well-intended residents.

I want to call your attention to an issue at 401 West Montgomery Ave, just a few steps from my historic home at 222. The Kalepe family lives at 401. Besides mom and dad, there are two darling boys, aged 9 and 11. And the boys want and need a small outdoor area where they can shoot baskets. Their grandparents installed a basketball hoop, and it was only after the fact that anyone discovered that the entire installation needed HDC approval. Now that it has been installed, it seems that the HDC wants it removed – at a potential cost of \$30,000 to the Kalipe family!

And generally, aside from the cost, I might agree. But in this case, I sincerely do not. The basketball area is totally blocked from the street by 7 beautiful trees – that the owners planted to create a visually pleasing view from West Montgomery Avenue.

This basketball area harms no one! And brings pleasure, exercise, and fitness to two young boys. *It should remain*.

The success of any law or regulation depends not so much on unbending adherence but on how much flexibility is built in. It truly boggles the mind that the HDC would spend even a minute of time on this issue. The Kalipe family has owned this historic property for several generations. They are not only responsible home owners, they are also responsible historic district residents.

Dear Members of the Rockville Historic District Commission,

I am writing to express my strong opposition to Certificate of Approval Application 2026 166-COA, submitted for the historic property located at 401 West Montgomery Avenue, Rockville, MD 20850. The applicant is seeking retroactive approval to retain the half-court sports court installed in the side yard of this historic property.

The installation of the sports court in the side yard of this historic home has had a negative impact on the historic character of the property. It completely replaced the side yard's soft grass carpet and landscaped setting, substituting it with modern sports court hardscape on a concrete base. This alteration significantly detracts from the property's historic aesthetic and charm.

The staff report notes that this sports court was initially installed without prior application or approval (as required for this historic landmark home), and subsequent applications for retroactive approval have been denied. Had an application for the sports court been submitted in advance it may or may not have been approved in some form; That we cannot know now. But we do know that as built it has a negative impact on the property's historic setting and integrity, and prior citations to remove it have been ignored. Allowing retroactive approval would set a concerning precedent. It would suggest that disregard for the regulations agreed upon regarding the stewardship of historic properties can be overlooked and even rewarded.

For these reasons I strongly urge the Historic District Commission to deny the retroactive approval for the sports court at 401 West Montgomery Avenue. Thank you for your service and your attention to this matter.

To the committee,

Thank you so much for taking the time to listen to this community dispute. I'm sure that this is your least favorite part of the job. I think under these circumstances, no one is the winner.

I am writing to express my extreme concern with respect to the installation and maintenance of the basketball paved area at the side yard of the above property. I see from previous meeting minutes that this basketball court has already been adjudicated. This is the fourth and hopefully final time. Please let us put this to rest, and allow the decision to be actioned posthaste.

As a resident of the Rockville Historic West End (Beall Ave), I understand why people may not gain permission for renovations. Many homeowners report finding the permitting process tedious. I understand that people may flout city/historic regulations because it's expedient, cheaper, and/or easier. When we moved into Beall Avenue we found there were several items on our property that lacked permitting, and/or inspection certificates. We were encouraged to retroactively permit everything to make sure the house was compliant and up to code. We spent a lot of money making sure our house was properly permitted and inspected. When I spoke with the permits office, they were encouraging and helped us through the process.

Separately, I was disappointed and worried when many contractors from whom we sought quotes for renovations encouraged us against the permitting process. Many advocated performing renovations without permits. I find this worrisome. Especially since that once I engaged with the Rockville permitting office, I found them nothing but a group of helpful, thoughtful people. They are ready to be on the phone whenever I have questions. They were fast, efficient, and thorough.

Please see attached a public post made by a resident of 401 W Montgomery on their Facebook feed, and in the "sixx cool moms" Facebook group. As you can see, the resident stated that she did not seek a permit or permission, "nor did I need one". I find this idea incredulous. Given that a large portion of the side yard is now paved and there are a lot of city ordinances with respect to paving. The fact that 401 West Montgomery - a registered historic home at the time of purchase - did not need a permit to pave almost the entirety of their side yard to the fence-line I think is unlikely.

I think historic homes are beautiful, I'm glad that they're there, but I don't think that just because something is old means it should be preserved in a free society. However I appreciate that rules exist within our community which everyone in our area agrees to abide by them. There are even more restrictions for historic homes. The public declaration from the homeowner that they did not know they would need permission from the Historic Society or the city to install a basketball court is ridiculous on its face. Publically, she stated that she inherited the home, and therefore did not know she needed permission for such an installation. As an immigrant, and a new homeowner in the USA, I knew we would need permits for any renovations. A person who grew up in the local area then claiming they weren't aware that permits and permissions were needed belies belief. Even though I do not live in an historic home, speaking to any resident living in one for any length of time, they will advise you of all the additional restrictions they have to their liberty with respect to renovations and changes. My understanding is that all historic home owners are notified extensively about the things they can and cannot do with their historic homes and that includes their yards.

Generally speaking I would say that, if work on your property on your or on your yard is safe, up to code, and doesn't disturb anybody that you should be able to do what you want. I think that permitting, and permissions helps West End residents of Rockville manage safety, and help everyone to remain neighborly. Looking at the photographs submitted to the committee, the basketball court goes right up to the fence line shared between 401 West Montgomery and 405 West Montgomery. This does not seem to be neighborly. Basketball courts are surprisingly noisy. Even with sound mitigation, the sharp ping, and the long-wave thump of a basketball hitting a court, drills through walls. The thumping is especially disruptive. I do not believe anyone should have a basketball court in yards as small and close as the ones in the historic west end. Especially considering there are at least 3 full courts and 4 half courts within 0.5 miles of this property (3 full at Welsh Park, and 4 half at Beall Elementary).

Even if a basketball court installation were approved, the proximity to the fence line with the basketball court in question indicates that no thought was given to their neighbours. My understanding from the resident of 401 is that the rear yard was not considered at the time of installation because of the landscaping and flattening requirements. The fact that subsequently the homeowners at 401 West Montgomery flattened their rear yard to make a gorgeously flat meadow suggests this problem has since been resolved. I'm sure anyone would prefer to look at a beautiful grassy meadow, than a hot and noisy basketball court.

I think that the committee should only acquiesce to the basketball remaining in place if Rockville permitting and the historic district society would have always allowed it in place over the objections of neighbors. I think that no one should be able to retroactively get permission for any addition that would never have succeeded in the first place. I think that if the committee takes the action of retroactive approval, this will be the course of action for all future controversial installations. Ultimately this voids the community consultation requirement altogether. I don't think design guidelines are the way to go, but having a central arbiter like the City of Rockville permitting office, or the historic committee such as yourselves to facilitate opportunities for public comment (i.e. what we have currently) is a great position. This is where the community can come together and discuss installations i.e. basketball courts, and they may be managed to make sure that everyone remains neighborly before it goes out of proportion. I think if there had been no objections to the installation, we wouldn't be having this conversation. However, because no permission/permitting was sought, there was no opportunity for their neighbors to object and thus allow the residents of 401 to correct the dispute before it became expensive.

Finally, the application of the residents at 401 West Montgomery for retroactively approving this basketball court has been denied on more than one occasion. There was a stalled court case, and extensive citations. At what point is there some kind of enforcement mechanism for violations. I appreciate that the residents at 401 don't want to destroy a thing that they have created, and a portion of their home that they use. However, the idea that if any resident fights long enough, then they will get to keep a renovation that clearly violates the community rules, then I think retroactive approval will forever undermine the committee's authority. Everyone will do what they want and apply for retroactive approval and fight the committee forever.

I appreciate that the installation of the basketball court was expensive. The removal will also be expensive. However the excuse that the residents of a historical home thought they did not need a permit/permission for this amount of paving is belies belief. I think installing this basketball court in a residential area is incredibly inconsiderate. I think it would have been objected to even if it were not in an historic home.

I don't envy the committee having to adjudicate this discussion. Neighbors are publicly asking for support for both sides. However, I think that if you stick to the rules as written for now that is the correct course of action. If someone would like to change rules in the future to include basketball courts being allowed in historic homes without permissions or permitting, and paving side yards to the fenceline, then that should be a bridge to cross in the future. For now, please follow the rules as written. If someone then deliberately tries to circumvent the rules, there is precedent for maintaining the rules. People avoiding the permitting process for expediency should not be rewarded. Unfortunately, everyone should be responsible for correcting their errors, even if it is expensive. Play stupid games: Win stupid prizes.

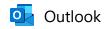

My name is Maureen O'Connell, and I live on Laird Street in the West End, a short walk from 401 W. Montgomery Avenue. I'm writing in support of the Kalepe family's retroactive Certificate of Approval for their small rear-yard basketball area.

First, I want to acknowledge the importance of the City's historic-preservation process. From everything I understand, the applicant is not asking to be exempt from the rules. Rather, she's participating in the proper channels and asking for balanced discretion now that the situation is before you. In my view, a good process includes the ability to appeal, consider mitigating factors, and correct honest mistakes without disproportionate penalties.

On the merits:

- The court is in the rear yard, largely unseen from the public way, and does not alter the historic façade or streetscape. The view from West Montgomery Avenue remains the same.
- The installation is modest and reversible; it can be removed in the future without damage to historic fabric.
- It is comparable in impact to the many rear-yard family amenities found at other historic homes in our neighborhood (patios, play areas, small recreation spaces).

I also want to highlight the broader community context. The Kalepe family are active, constructive neighbors. Kelly is engaged with the West End Citizens

Association (WECA) and helps plan kid-friendly activities in the community—like painting kindness rocks- that bring neighbors together. She and her family volunteer as coaches with the City and even started a local youth soccer program that gives kids a safe, supervised outlet. The rear-yard court directly supports that mission of healthy, active, safe play for children—something our community should encourage.

Approving this COA would not set a precedent that "forgiveness beats permission." It would show that the Commission can apply the standards with judgment, taking into account the work's location, reversibility, lack of impact on character-defining features, and the applicant's sustained good-faith efforts to make things right.

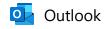

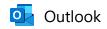

As a neighbor and historic home lover, I want to begin with my sincere appreciation for the HDC's role in safeguarding the character and history of Rockville. Your time, expertise, and careful consideration are why our community remains a place we are proud to call home. Thank you for that stewardship.

I am writing in strong support of approving the Kalepe family's retroactive Certificate of Approval (COA) for the small backyard sport court at 401 W. Montgomery Avenue.

Dear Members of the Historic District Commission,

I am writing to express my strong opposition to the retroactive application for a Certificate of Approval (2026-166-COA) submitted by the owner of 401 West Montgomery Avenue, seeking permission to retain a half-court basketball installation in the side yard of the property.

The issue before the Commission is not simply one of landscaping or recreational use, but one of principle and precedent. The applicant constructed this installation without prior HDC approval, despite clear requirements under the Rockville City Code and the well-established procedures governing exterior alterations within the Historic District. A court order was subsequently issued directing removal of the structure, yet the applicant continues to seek post-facto approval.

1. Equal Application of the Law

The Historic District's authority depends on consistent and impartial enforcement of its standards. Either the rules apply to everyone, or they cease to have meaning. Allowing this retroactive approval would send a message that those who disregard established procedure can later seek forgiveness rather than permission. That approach is incompatible with the preservation ethic the Commission is charged to uphold.

2. Ignorance and Cost Are Not Defenses

Any claims that the applicant was unaware of the permitting requirements, or that removal would now be costly, are not legitimate defenses. Every purchaser of a property within a designated Historic District assumes both the benefits and the responsibilities that come with that designation. Any claims of ignorance of the regulations does not exempt an owner from compliance, nor does expense excuse a violation that was entirely preventable.

3. Responsibility to the Broader Community

Historic preservation depends upon trust — that each homeowner will follow the same procedures, respect the same guidelines, and preserve the same character of our shared streetscape. If individual exceptions are allowed on grounds of convenience or personal preference, the collective value of the Historic District is undermined. To approve this application would effectively erode the foundation on which the entire district rests.

4. A Matter of Informed Choice

Before purchasing my own home, I considered a historic property in Ellicott City. I met with their

Historic District Commission to understand the responsibilities such ownership entails. Their staff generously explained the rules and limitations — information that helped me decide not to proceed with the purchase. Anyone buying within Rockville's Historic District is afforded the same opportunity for due diligence. The applicant's claim of unawareness therefore strains credibility.

5. Preserving the Integrity of the District

The City's staff report from October 2023 and the prior HDC decisions all found that the basketball court is inconsistent with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation (#1, #2, #9, #10). The Commission's mandate is clear: new work must be compatible with the historic setting and reversible without permanent harm to the property's character. This installation fails those tests.

If the Commission were to approve this application despite repeated violations and prior denials, it would not only diminish the credibility of its own decisions but also invite future disregard for the process by other property owners. At that point, the City might as well consider dissolving the Historic District altogether, because the rules would have lost their force.

In conclusion, I respectfully urge the Commission to deny this retroactive application and require full removal of the basketball court, including the concrete base, to restore the property's historic integrity. Upholding the standards of preservation is not always easy or convenient, but it is essential to fairness, accountability, and the protection of our shared heritage.

Thank you for your time and your continued commitment to preserving Rockville's historic character.
